IFWISH WAR VICTIMS AIDED BY LEO FRANK

"Knows What It Is to Suffer Unjustly," He Says in Letter.

'With the words, "Knowing what it is to suffer unjustly and having a deep sense of sympathy for our coreligionists who are innocent suffers," Leo M. Frank has sent from the jail a check for \$5 for 500 Jewish relief stamps for war victims.

Frank's letter was written recently to Harry Fischel, treasurer of the central committee for the relief of Jews suffering in the war zone. with the check was the following let-

ter:

"I feel that when these stamps were sent me, the party sending them was ignorant of the condi-tions surrounding me at present, as you doubtless know I am, and have been for the past two years, most unjustly incarcerated in prison. I presume you have read of my case and are more or less familiar with

The \$5 had been collected in a day from the many visitors who appear at Frank's cell in the Tower daily. An appeal had been sent to him from the Jewish Relief society, headquarters of which is located in New York.

Frank's health continues good. exercises daily and he 48 Visited throughout the day. Most of his time is spent reading and writing, and he keeps thoroughly versed on the news topics.
