NEGRO SWEEPER TELLS OFFICER FRANK ASKED HIM TO WRITE SOME NOTES BEFORE TRAGEDY

He Thinks These Notes Are the Same as Those Found by the Body of the Murdered Girl, but Had Not Seen the Original Notes When He Made His Sensational Statement to the Detectives Saturday Morning

NEGRO STUCK TO HIS STORY THROUGH GRUELLING EXAMINATION IN SOLICITOR'S OFFICE SATURDAY

Conley Voluntarily Sent for Detectives to Make His Statement. It Is Declared - He Told the Detectives That He Wanted to Confess the Whole Truth, That Frank Called Him Into His Office and Told Him He Wanted to See His Writing

Saturday morning James Conley, the negro sweeper formerly employed in the pencil factory where Mary Phagan was killed, and who was arrested on suspicion and has been held in jail since as a material witness for the state, went for Detective John Black and declared that he wanted to tell the truth.

"Some I wrote these notes," said he, referring to the mysterious notes found beside the dead body of Mary Phagan.

He declared that he could not identify them positively, inasmuch as he had never seen the originals, but that as they were read to him out of the papers he believed they were the ones he wrote.

On Friday, the day before the murder, said he to detectives, Leo M. Frank called him into his (Frank's) office at the factory and said he wanted to get some samples of this handwriting, and dictated for him to write dictating, said the negro, what he remembered as substantially the notes that afterward were read to him out of the newspapers.

The negro was asked immediately to the courthouse, when some one saw him washing a shirt at the factory, his defense was that it was his sole and only shirt, and that he was washing it so that he would appear clean at the inquest, whether he had been summoned as a possible witness.

HERE IS NEGRO'S AFFIDAVIT. The following affidavit was made by Conley and is in possession of the city detective department:

STATE OF GEORGIA. COUNTY OF FULTON. Personally appeared before the undersigned, a Notary Public in and for the County of Fulton, James Conley, who being sworn, depose and say:


On Friday evening before the Holiday, about four minutes to 1 o'clock, Mr. Frank came up the stairs and asked me to come to his office. That was the tale on the fourth floor where I was working, and what I went down to the office he asked me to write and I told him yes I could write a little bit, and he gave me a scratch pad and told me what to put on it, and told me to put on there, "Dear mother, a long tall black negro did this by himself," and he told me to write two or three times on there. I wrote on another scratch pad, a brown looking scratch pad, and looked at my writing and wrote on that himself, but when I went to his office he asked me if I wanted a cigarette and I told him yes but they didn't allow any smoking in the factory, and he pulled out a box of cigarettes that cost \$6 a box and in that box he had \$1.50, two paper dollars and two quarters, and I took one of the cigarettes and handed him the box back and he told me that was all right I could keep the box, and I told him he had more money in the box, and he said that was all right I was welcome to that for I was a good working negro around there, and then he asked me

The Journal Is Presenting Below the Complete Stenographic Report of the Interview in the Williams House, in Which Mayor Woodward, E. O. Miles, G. C. February and A. S. Colyar Took Part, While the Dictograph Recorded the Conversation

THAT Mayor James G. Woodward was photographed by the city detectives on Wednesday afternoon, shortly after Colonel Woodward had concluded his interview in Room 31 of the Williams House No. 2, 2435 North Forsyth street, was made public Saturday morning by Chief of Detectives N. A. Lanford.

The Atlanta Journal presents below the complete stenographic report of the conversation reported to Mayor Woodward by the dictograph. The report also gives in detail the statements accredited to E. O. Miles, the private detective present while the dictograph was at work. Only one or two unprintable words have been omitted from the record which The Journal has secured.

The nature of the interview accredited to Mayor Woodward by the dictograph is the statement by him that he was looking for evidence against the police department and particularly against Chief of Police James H. Beavers. The mayor is also quoted as saying that there were enough votes in the police board to remove Chief Beavers if they could get the evidence.

The sworn statement of Stenographer George H. Gentry, detailing the alleged dictographed conversation in which the mayor testified is given below.

The following statements were overheard by me, by using a dictograph located in room 31, of the Williams House No. 2, 2435 North Forsyth street, Atlanta, Ga., said dictograph being connected with room No. 31 of the said hotel, and I saw Mr. E. O. Miles, whom I am personally acquainted with, Mr. G. C. February, whom I have known for several years, and Mr. A. S. Colyar, with whom I have only been connected acquainted, about 11 o'clock, in room No. 31 of said hotel, at about 4 o'clock on the afternoon of May 21, 1918.

On account of Mr. February having been locked out of room No. 31, I was delayed in getting in, after having witnessed the three parties above mentioned enter room No. 31 of said hotel, in the emergency I used the key to my front door, which was a little difficulty opened the door. After closing the door and getting to the instrument I was unable to hear what was being said, very distinctly on account of the windows of the said room being open. This necessitated another delay in hearing the following conversation, which I was able to hear at that point, because inaudible.

February: I can tell you some things. I am secretary to Lanford. Miles: Now just wait a minute. I know. I have got several cases. Colyar: (Question incoherent). Miles: I am satisfied you ought, but you know when they go into it they are going to get up a howl. Colyar: (Conversation too low to catch). Miles: The mayor will give an absolute assurance that he will protect. Colyar: Will you bring the mayor up here? Right now? Miles: I think I can bring the mayor up here right away. The evidence is in the... Colyar: It looks like a frame-up on Felder and they couldn't detect... Colyar: You are not a Jew are you? Miles: No I am not, I spell my name M-I-L-E-S. Colyar: These sons of a gun down here can frame up anything on Decatur street. I think I can bring the mayor up here right away, outside the county and I would meet you and him at East Lake. Miles: There is no occasion for your leaving town. Colyar: I can't leave town. I am afraid to stay here. February: If the mayor and Felder will stay behind us like they said they would, I will have the mayor's assurance. Miles: But right now he may be dead. February: He can get out. Mr. Felder is a good fellow. Now, it will take about ten minutes in any

LEO M. FRANK IS INDICTED BY GRAND JURY FOR MARY PHAGAN'S DEATH; NEGRO, NEWT LEE HELD

True Bill Against Pencil Factory Superintendent Returned Less Than Ten Minutes After Evidence Was Closed, at Noon, Saturday. Authority Quoted That He Will Be Tried During Third Week in June—Negro to Stay in Jail

SOLICITOR DORSEY DID NOT ASK JURY TO ACT ON BILL PENDING AGAINST WATCHMAN

Grand Jury's Session Began Friday Morning - Many Witnesses Examined, but Not All That Solicitor Has Were Introduced Into Grand Jury Room—Change Is That Frank Killed Mary Phagan by Choking Her With a Cord That He Tied

Leo M. Frank, superintendent of the National Pencil factory in the basement of which the slain body of Mary Phagan was found in the early morning of Sunday, April 27, stands formally charged with her death.

A grand jury indictment, a true bill charging that he killed Mary Phagan, was returned by the Fulton county grand jurors at 11:25 Saturday afternoon.

Less than ten minutes earlier, the jury had gone into executive session and Solicitor Dorsey, who had been conducting the examination of witnesses, had left the room. In the interval, the jury reached its verdict and each of the jurors signed his name to the formal document upon which Frank will be arraigned on the charge of murder.

NO ACTION AGAINST NEWT LEE. No action was taken with respect to the negro night watchman, Newt Lee, held by the coroner on a "suspicion" warrant for the grand jury.

Mr. Dorsey stated afterward that he had not asked the grand jury to take action with regard to Lee. It is probable, seemingly, that the grand jury will not return a "true" or "not" bill to Lee's case until after the trial of Superintendent Frank.

Lee, therefore, will remain in jail meanwhile, with the charge hanging over him there as a suspect.

It is assumed with the best of authority that the indicted man, Leo M. Frank, will be put on trial during the third week in June, less than a month hence.

It is known that several witnesses whom the state has secured to prosecute its charges were not introduced before the grand jury as follows:

The jury's true bill charges Frank with the murder of "Miss" Leo M. Frank, the daughter of the pencil factory superintendent, who was killed on the 27th day of April in the year of our Lord 1918, with force of arms he did unlawfully and with malice aforethought kill and murder one Mary Phagan, by him and by the choking her with a cord that he tied around her neck.

Neither the negro nor Frank appeared before the grand jury. Both remained in the Tower, where they have been confined since the coroner's inquest ordered them to be held.

PROSECUTOR ASSISTED. The Fulton county grand jury began its second day of the murder of Mary Phagan at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, taking up the case of Leo M. Frank and Newt Lee, held at the instance of the coroner's jury.

Indications were that the case would conclude during the day. Each of the twenty-one grand jurors

who were present Friday was on hand when the probe was resumed and in addition George A. Greenbo, who had reported the murder of Mary Phagan to the coroner, was present. The state witness was Miss Grace Hill, who would side by side with Mary Phagan at the pencil factory, Miss M. J.

CHIEF LANFORD'S RIGHT HAND MAN

THE JOURNAL'S BIG STORY OF DICTOGRAPH AND ALLEGED BRIBE HAS STARRED THE WHOLE CITY

Chief Lanford Stated Saturday That Mayor Woodward, C. C. Jones and Others Were Also Dictographed on the Same Day That Col. Felder Was-The Complete Dictograph Record of These Conversations Appears in Today's Journal

"I HAVE DONE MY WORK," DECLARES CHIEF LANFORD, "IT IS NOW UP TO GRAND JURY FOR FURTHER ACTION"

The dramatic story in the Journal's home edition Friday afternoon, describing how the city detectives and their representative dictographed Colonel Thomas B. Felder in Atlanta, has been the center of certain papers in the Phagan case from the safe of Detective Chief Lanford. He gave his opinion that the dictographing of Colonel Felder would in no wise hamper or affect the work of the Bureau detectives in their investigation of the Phagan murder mystery. The chief expressed his confidence in the integrity of the Bureau men.

Chief Lanford Saturday morning made it known that Mayor Woodward, Charles C. Jones, E. O. Miles and others were also dictographed. The record of their conversations in the dictographing of Chief Lanford did not discuss the substance of the mayor's dictographing. He gave his opinion that the dictographing of Colonel Felder would in no wise hamper or affect the work of the Bureau detectives in their investigation of the Phagan murder mystery.

4. S. COLYAR MAKES REPLY TO STATEMENT OF COLONEL FELDER

BRIEF AND CORRUPTION ARE CHARGED TO CITY DETECTIVES AND POLICE BY COL. T. B. FELDER

Attorney Who Was Dictographed by the Detectives Gives Out a Statement, Additional to the One He Made Friday Afternoon, in Which He Goes After Police and Detective Departments, and Intimates That More Is to Come in the Sunday Papers

SAYS DETECTIVES ARE DESTROYING EVIDENCE AGAINST FRANK IN THE PHAGAN MURDER CASE

Attorney Thomas B. Felder, who has been charged by city detectives with attempted bribery of Chief of Detectives Lanford's secretary, G. C. Febery, has made a statement additional to one he made Friday afternoon before reading the dictograph records in The Journal. The attorney's complete and detailed statement, in which he promotes sensational exposures of the police, will be given the Sunday papers.

"I was to obtain proof of this that I conspired to visit A. S. Colyar on the Williams house on Wednesday afternoon. When I got there Colyar and Febery claimed to have in their possession the police graft protection list. They also claimed to have all affidavits showing the immorality of the two chiefs, Lanford and Beavers. They wanted me to buy these papers for \$1,500, and I, of course, refused."

As to the dictographs, continued Colonel Felder, "I am going to show them to the grand jury. "Since the arrival of C. W. Tobbs, the Bureau expert, who is seeking to find out the whereabouts of poor little Mary Phagan, the detective has continually blocked the path. "They have seen many witnesses, telling them that the state's case is complete and that the state already has all of the affidavits it needs. They then tell the witnesses that the Bureau people and I are really trying to shield Frank, and then the detective ask each witness to refuse to talk with the Bureau men."

"I WILL EXPOSE CHIEF LANFORD. "Chief Lanford has been working in many ways to thwart justice, and I determined to expose him and his malpractice. His intrusion of my determination in some way, and knowing that his neck was in jeopardy, he set about to save his job and his reputation. "He tried this. And what a miserable, stinking farce he has made of himself and his department. "I am convinced that Lanford is in the employ of Frank," Mr. Felder declared. "One of the several things, which convinced me is a purported confession obtained by the detective from a poor negro named Connelly who has been kept in jail illegally for three weeks. Febery declared that he had formulated the alleged confession himself and that while he was in the employ of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Coleman but had since been retained to assist the state by friends and neighbors of the late Phagan girl. His fee is \$100 a day. He is a citizen of the Bullhead district. He has, which Colonel Felder has previously announced, he could contribute to the Bureau fund, he read at \$200, he says."

TRUST COMPANY PROBE HALTED AUDITOR AT WORK

Upon an agreement reached by the attorneys of both sides in the case of the Guarantee Trust and Banking company, which was in the hands of the auditor, a halt was put on a re-examination of the books of the company and pending for several weeks. E. C. Meacham, auditor, was appointed by John T. Pennington to go over the books of the company and report back to the court within two weeks. In the meantime all action in the case is suspended. The court ordered also that particular inquiry be made into the affairs of the former trustee of the company, the Guaranty Trust and Banking company, which Sam B. Smith, president of the Guaranty Trust and Banking company, and H. H. Meacham, of the same company, are interested in. The committee suggests that a resolution be held soon to look into the matter more fully, and into the operation of other commercial banks in the south.

DISCUSS FUTURE OF W. & A. RAILROAD

A suggestion that a convention be called in Atlanta of representative southern business men to consider the future of the Western and Atlantic railroad was made Friday afternoon at a meeting of the W. & A. railroad committee at the chamber of commerce. The chairman, W. A. Wimbush, read a carefully prepared statement, which showed that, while the lease of the road does not expire until 1915, yet it would be advisable to begin consideration of future action at once. Whether the road shall be released or taken over by the state, whether it shall be extended to the sea; whether it shall be leased for a long or short term; whether the leasing of Chattanooga shall be included in the lease; whether the road shall be under the A. & W. and a railroad—were some of the problems presented in the chairman's statement.
