Charleston, W. Va., June 7 .- Pres-Charleston, W. Va., June 7.—President John M. White and eighteen other officials of the United Mine Workers of America, were indicted in the federal court here today on a charge of violating the Sherman antitrust law. It is alleged the defendants conspired with the coal operators of western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to raise wages in the West Virginia coal fields, so as to prevent its competition with other states.

Those named in the indictment are John P. White, president: Frank J. Mayes, vice president: Thomas Haggerty, Joseph Vazy, James Cantrell Charles Hatley, Marco Roman, George H. Edmonds and Benjamin F. Morris, organizers of the United Mine Workers of America; Thomas Cairns, president; Clarence C. Griffith, vice president; James M. Crago, secretary of district No. 17, United Mine Workers of America, and James Diana, John Nutter, Rome Mitchell, W. S. Reese, F. D. Stanley, U. S. Cantley and A. D. Alexander subordinate officer of district No. 17.

First Labor Case

It is said here that this case is the first one in which officers of labor organizations have been indicted on charges of having violated the Sherman anti-trust law.

The indictments charge that the nineteen men engaged in a combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade and commerce. The offense is said to have started September 1, 1912, and continued since.

The indictment alleged that coast produced in West Virginia is shipped in competition with coal mined in the other states of the competitive field and that not more than 15 per cent of the coal output of West Virginia is consumed within the state.

"The object and purpose of the United Mine Workers is to fix wages to be paid to laborers and to refuse to allow said laborers to work unless said wages are paid," the complaint further reads. Continuing, it stated.

"The organization intends to unionize the miners in West Virginia, and, if successful, to fix the price at which coal of West Virginia could be sold in the outside markers named, thus permitting the competitive states to compete more favorably in the western markets with the product shipped from West Virginia."



Special emphasis is given to the importance of the task devolving upon the legislature this summer of revising the revenue system of the state by the fact that \$3.679,000, considerably more than half of the state's bonded debt, will fall due July I 1915, and provision for its refunding must be made by this general assembly. State Treasurer W. J. Speer calls attention to the necessity of retiring or refunding these bonds in his annual report which is now in the hands of the printer, and which will go to the governor early this week.

After stating that the amount of the state's indebtedness on December 21 of last year was \$6,730,702, the report will say:

"About one-half of the above amount is made up of bonds issued under the act of 1894, amounting to \$3,332,000, and those issued under the act of 1894, amounting to \$237,000, will become due in 1915. ### Time Not Ripe for New Constitution Declares Judge Andrew J. Cobb

Athens. Ga., June 7.—(Special.)—
As voicing the sentiments of probably the larger part of the leading legal minds in the state, the report to the Georgia Bar association of the permanent commission on the revision of manent commission on the revision of judicial system and proceedure is more than interesting. As that report concerns the much talked of constitution.

To the history of the different constitutions of this state is to emphasize the fact that the necessity of amendment was salways provided. The simplest and most expeditious decided is that contained in our present constitution.

As that report concerns the much-talked of constitutional convention for Georsis, the consensus of opinion of the legal mind of the state is interesting to discover. The report was made at the meeting last week of the Georgia bar by Judge Andrew J. Cobb of Athens, former supreme court justice of the state, who is chairman of the commission.

Judge Cobb does not believe that the time is ripe to make changes in the constitutional government of the state. His report in part is as follows:

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### WHICH WAY, ATLANTA?

Here is a straight-from-the-shoulder talk in business to the people of Atlanta. Muflicipally speaking, their house is in disgraceful order. Matters have reached a crisis. Either the city must forthwith bandon the old financial plan of living from hand to mouth, or it must commit Aself indefinitely to a policy of marking time.

We can't wear blinders any longer. The supreme court crematory situation tore them from our eyes. And it is up to us to look the situation in the face. No more can we fall back on the moral obligation device to secure municipal improvements. Other methods must be found if the city is to grow and not to go backward.

What are the facts? For a good many decades we have been trying to make current income meet current expenses in this city and provide also for permanent improvements, all of them the inevitable penalties of growth. From the start that policy has been a foolish one. Any business house that tried it would be headed for bankruptcy, and every business man knows it. A city can be no more successful at financial acrobatics than a business house.

Following this delusive will-o'-the-wisp, we have let Atlanta run down at the beel. At the commencement exercises of the Girls' High school, the other day, President Daley, of the board of education, made an indignant protest against this policy. He said the high school was housed in an antiquated, inadequate and ramshackle structure. He said the miserable parsimony of the city was dooming its young womanhood to secure an education amid disgraceful and insanitary surroundings. That is all true. It is true, too, of other schools of the city. It is true of the sewer system. It is 'true of the sanitary department. It is true of any department of the city government. hospitals, police, fire, what not, that grows and demands money with growth.

There is another feature. We are now rebuilding this city, in a way. We are changing impossible grades and widening streets: and we haven't, in the way of regrading and rebuilding, paving and repaying, laying new sewers and providing new ones, come anywhere within whispering distance of the work that should be done if Atlanta is to be built for half a century in stead of just for today.

We cannot bind succeeding councils. And, having set our face toward a metropolis, and a healthy, up-to-date metropolis, at that, we cannot turn backward.

There is just one resource. The city must do as any business would do-it must utilize its borrowing credit. Business that seeks to live and expand simply on its capital goes under. The city that attempts that folly beckons dry-rot. Atlanta has in cold storage six million dollars of credit. It is good in any money market in the world. It is protected by the most rigid constitutional safeguards in the country. The improvements that cry for materialization are to benefit posterity even more than ourselves. The enhanced value from these improvements will more than absorb sinking fund and interest.

these imperative improvements? Council there is not the remotest danger of the reand the finance committee think so. The one has framed and the other has adopted a resolution creating a commission of ten councilmen and five citizens. This commission is to investigate and report regarding the advisability and dimensions and purposes of a bond issue. The finance committee knows there is no alternative. Council knows that, too. It is simply for the people of Atlanta to awake to the situation as council and the committee have awaked.

The city stands at the cross-roads. It is up to its people to say, and say swiftly, which fork it shall take.

### THE Y. W. C. A.

Without the blare of a single trumpet the Young Women's Christian Association has done and is doing one of the noblest and most practical works of constructive uplift in the range of Atlanta's activities An interview with Mrs. Harry Dewar, a member of the executive board, and published elsewhere, gives a glimpse into the scope and purpose of the undertaking. What the Young Men's Christian Association is to the young men of the city, the Young Women's Christian Association is to the young women of the city, and more. Proverbially, the boy has more sources for self-help and self-protection than the girl-Alone in the city, his plight is sufficiently serious. But it is not remotely comparable to the plight of the girl under the same conditions. She must earn a living. She must, at the same time, try against odds to equip herself to better her condition. And she must also fight against the dangers and the temptations, enemies that often threaten the more for her very innocence and lack of sophistication. It is girls of this class that the Y. W.

C. A. is founded to help, has helped and is helping. It furnishes a noonday refuge for the thousands of working women who must feed themselves cheaply, and who are in search of cleanly, congenial and safe surroundings. .It gives healthful athletics to the girl shut up all day earning her bread. It offers classes in domestic science, house hold economics, millinery and other occupations naturally pertaining to women. It conducts a boarding home for girls, where they may live at a reasonable rate and in perfect security, though the demands upon the home are greatly more than it can

As the Y. M. C. A. is an institution for the making and saving of men, so the Y. W. C. A. is an institution for the making and saving of women. It is wonderful that it has accomplished what it has with the handicap of poverty and adverse conditions. Through these disadvantages it is only partially filling its field. As Atlanta grows that field will become larger and more clamorously call for attention. The institution imperatively needs expansion. In the undertaking it should have the spontaneous support of the good people of Atlanta Money spent in this direction is not simply philanthropy. On the economic base of giving women a square deal and a fair start in life, it more than justifies itself as a public investment.

### .GEORGIA'S GOOD OUTLOOK.

The yield of the soil, which is everywhere the basis of prosperity, holds singular promise of a propitious season in Georgia. That prospect is strongly reinforced by weather developments of the past few days. Dispatches to The Constitution indicate that the long and threatening drouth in southwest Georgia has been broken by generous rains; that cotton has recovered from its previous uncertain outlook; that corn is flourishing, and that it is likely more of it will be produced than in any previous year. What is true of southwest Georgia is also true proportionately of other parts of the state. The big rains came at the strategic moment. When the fields were caked and the young crops drooping, the rains came and gave a fortu nate turn to the entire situation. The fall of 1913 may not be record-breaking in the state's history, from the agricultural point of view; but will at least register a healthy normal, and, in view of previous dubious prophecies, that fact is reassuring

Wholesome conditions here enable this state to view the problems of the forthcoming autumn and winter with tranquility. Since January 1, the pessimists have been busy throughout America. They have drazooned a number of factors upon which to premise a melancholy outlook. They point to the stagnation of the stock market and the general inactivity of Wall street as omens of evil. They declare that uncertainty over tariff revision is delaying progress. They say the high prices at which railways are floating imperative loans, and the unexplained circumstances of the Frisco receivership are discouraging items. The tightness of money in Europe, due to the war in the near east, and the perturbation in our own country, due to the Japanese war scare, have made them chew the cud of gloom.

Georgia has no reason to share any of this misgiving. Good crops are synonymous of good times, and the portents in Georgia are all of good crops. The same probability holds with regard to the remainder of the nation. From all sections come reports of abundant yields. The opening of the antumn will rout the pessimists. Revenues from all parts of the world will rell in for the south's cotton. The corn and the wheat of the nation will levy other tribute. Financial adversity cannot withstand the enormous largesse of the soil. As for Georgia.

That hope was fulfilled. The ban has been placed on the split skirt unless it is chaperoned by a blowsy under

Now, doesn't that beat the Dutch? To pere man the split skirt without an underskirt is no greater peril to masculine tranquility than the unsplit skirt worn also without an underskirt-and we are reliably informed that the latter style is all-pre vailing this summer. Indeed, as we see it, the split skirt is simply an inevitable evolution of the present styles with which, we assume, not even these horrified duennas of Indianapolis will quarrel. It would not, indeed, be surprising if most of the protesting ladies themselves affect this very style, which, to accept current report, is chiefly intended to exhibit the liberality of nature to frame and figure. In achieving this the average feminine garment is so constructed as to make the average lady appear as though she were poured into it. This end is perceptibly promoted by omiting the underskirt. So it is the discard for the underskirt! There you are! All the offending split skirt does is to go a tiny step farther, and by exhibiting what the nonsplit skirt only intimates, deprive imagination of its last prop. If either one is harmful we think the palm might be awarded to the non-split skirt. For the innuendo, in dress as in speech, is ever more suggestive than the outright statement.

However, we didn't start out on the uncharted sea of women's attire, to discuss which we confess our inability. The curl ous and interesting inconsistency of the Indianapolis ladies was what challenged our attention. We really see but one resort for them—and that is to agitate for a revival of the hoonskirt of our fathers-or mothers rather. No one but the men can possibly object to that. They might, too, decree that bathing suits be made hoopskirt fashion. Ladies never blink at shilling shockers worn in the surf which, if transferred to city pavements, would cause a riot and wholesale arrests-as would the average feminine costume of today, if it had been worn twenty years ago.

### RELIGION AND THE NEGRO.

H. H. Proctor, pastor of the First Conregational church, colored, of Atlanta, is one of the soundest and most practical of the leaders of the negro. In a recent sermon he emphasized an idea often advanced by The Constitution, and that is that religion must largely be depended upon to save the race from the perils facing it in common with the white race. In part he

Our race today in the midst of its Our race today in the midst of its general prosperity needs to take council from the heart of its fathers in the day of their adversity. . . Heartfelt religion is the solution of Jesus for the problem of the races. Both the industrial and literary types of education may be helpful, but the root of the trouble is not in the hands or the heads of the people, but in their hearts.

All this is quite true. The negro populaion of ante-bellum days was orderly and law-abiding for two reasons, chiefly: (1) The white man's civilization had the power to enforce regulations and restraints It knew to be good for this child race; (2) it was able to enforce and fortify those man dates by kindling religion in the heart of the negro, and it accomplished this latter ask by sending missionaries among the negroes. The Sunday school taught by the mistress of the plantation was one of the civilizing influences of the patriarchal era.

With the civil war the white men's first avenue to aid the negro, his power to enforce mandates, was destroyed. The other resort, that of religion, should have been made to do double duty and gradually to solve, for the negro's sake and our own, all the hard and dangerous problems that rose out of smancipation and reconstruction. In the old days the negro could be approached and largely controlled by his religious instinct, the cultivation of which in him was comparatively a simple matter. He is even today susceptible to that same influence. but who is exerting it upon him? Mainly his own people, and while they are making substantial headway, they are having only sporadic co-operation from the white race, which is largely busying itself with Africa and China.

As The Constitution has said, if the Christian churches of this country spent half as much money Christianizing the ne groes of America as Christianizing the heathen across the ocean, the racial problem would be materially mitigated. The white man's civilization would today be almost nowhere without its religion. What are we doing to take that constructive agency to the untutored negro, whose inefficiency and disease menace our own system almost as much as his own? Practically nothing!

### Public Water Supplies Are Analyzed by the State Board

In May, 1910, the Georgia State Board of Health established a laboratory for the chemical and bacteriological examination of water samples from the public water supplies of the state. In this work the board followed the example set by progressive state boards all over the country. Many of these heards have for twenty years or longer carried out extensive investigations in regard to water supplies, realizing that a safe water supply is one of the greatest assets of any community. To show the importance of such investigations it may be stated that in 1911 the Illinois legislature appropriated \$15,000 for the use of the state water survey, while similar amounts are

appropriated every year by Massachusetts. Pennsylvania, New York and other states. The inspections of watersheds, filter plants and all methods of purification are carried out in connection with this work and since the inspections were started in August 1911, about thirty Georgia cities have been visited for the purpose. Detailed reports of the conditions found and the results of analyses of samples subsequently examined, have been completed in over half these cases. Altogether nearly 900 samples have been snalyzed, more than one hundred public supplies contributing samples.

Among the plants recently inspected are those at Gainesville, Tocooa, Elberton, Rome, Cartersville, Calhoun, Dalton, Cedartown, LaGrange, West Point, Milledgeville, Covington, Eatonton and Jackson.

About twenty requests for the examination of samples from public water supplies been received within the last weeks showing that there is a growing ealization of the need of frequent analyse of samples of water furnished to the public

### Rich Men's Financial "Follies."

Though it is undoubtedly true that the investors lured into mistakes by extravagant advertisements in conscienceless newspapers or by cunningly writen circular letter run into many millions yearly, they are probably exceeded in amount by the losses that are made in securities of doubtful merit by even the sbrewdest and most successful husiness men. Not infrequently, a case of the atter kind comes to light, where the "victim"

business men. Not infrequently, a case of the latter kind comes to light, where the "victim" is found to have been some man of great prominence in the financial world. He may even have been one of those commonly credited with some mysterious faculty for achieving success in the investment markets—perhaps, one of those whose successes are sometimes ascribed to "inside information" and other like advantages not possessed by the average investor.

For example, it was shown by the expert appraisal of the \$70,000,000 estate of the late Edward H. Harriman that that great railroad genius and financier had among his holdings of securities worthless stocks and honds of the par value of more than \$4,000,000. Several millions of such securities were reported by the experts who completed in April last their appraisal of the real and personal property of the possessor of the great Astor fortune, who lost his life in the Titante disaster in the spring of 1912. And while these instances are being noticed widely in the current news, similar instances can be recalled from the older records. Appraisers

these instances are being noticed widely in the current news, similar instances can be recalled from the older records. Appraisers of the \$66,000.000 estate of Russell Sage, who died in 1906, reported as worthless a miscellaneous lot of stocks and honds, amounting to about \$1,000.000 par value. Among the securities in the \$75,000.000 estate of Jay Gould, who died in 1892, there were worthless issues of the face value of \$2,000,000. But, however striking these examples of unwise investments made by men so able to command investment wisdom, there is little in them that should cause the investor of more limited resources to despair. From the lists of worthless securities held by almost any wealthy investor like a Harriman or an Astor, it is necessary to make a good many eliminations to get at an estimate of the amount which measures actual error of judgment. Many stocks and bonds of strang, names and characteristics find their way into the possession of such investors, bringing little, if any, expectation of return.

"This has so enormously greduced the total supply of hird life that today drastic measures are of bird life that today drastic measures are being enacted into law, which ten years ago were regarded as wildly impossible of enact-

"The time has come when the Christian nations of Europe and America must resolutely stop this commercial slaughter, or else see hundreds of species of the most beautiful and interesting birds of the world absolutely exterminated. I appear here to ask congress to stop absolutely the activi-ties of the American people in the extermination of birds for millinery purposes. This slaughter is so fiercely vigorous, so relentiless and so cruel that species are being exterminated at a rate so ararming as to arrest the attention of all civilized nations.

# Tallulah Power Plant to Operate by August; Giant Dam and Tunnel Are Already Built

Suspense as to Fate of Construction Work at Tallulah Falls Dispelled by Verdict in Land Suit at Clayton.

Tallulah, Falls, June 7—(Special)—
Work on the \$5,000,000 electric power plant being constructed here has bounded forward with renewed impetus this week With the verdict won by the power company in the state's land shit hearing in Clayton. a cloud of uncertainty has been removed cloud of uncertainty has been removed Suspense as to the fate of Tallulah has been dispelled. There is now not the slightest doubt but that the work will be pushed forward to an early complet tion, and the engineers declare in fact that it will be ready for operation b August.

Two of the three great divisions of the construction work—the dam and the tunnel—aband now complete. The third, which is the power house, is the center of increased activity. Hundrede of men are working day and night in bring it to the point where it least one of its five enormous generators, each of which will make 17,000 horse-power of electricity, can be put in operation. As soon as the work reaches this point the sluice gates in the dam will be closed and waters of the mad Tallulah will be banked up over a hundred feet above the river bed and turned into the long and tortuous tunnel and then sent catapulting down through the generators in the power house. Thus will the encryy of nature stand harnessed and ready to grind the mills and run the wheels of Georgia.

Tallulah in the Limelight.

As the date approached for the hearing of the famous land suit last week in Clayton, speculation as to the outcome of the case spread all over the country. Tallulah Falls and the construction work going on came into the limelight more than ever before Thousands of people not only in Georgia, but in other states, turned to watch the hearing of the case in Rabun county. 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
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









Put a cake of soap (laundry will do) in a pint of hot water, stir vigorously and remove the soap Saturate this Design with the soap and water mixture, then remove the excess moisture by partially drying the saturated Design or by spylying a sheet of blotting paper. Place the material or fabric to which the design is to be transferred on a hard, flat surface and lay the Design, face down, upon the material. Cover with a dry sheet of thick paper or two folds of newspaper, and with the lays are the material or not wet the material nor rub the face of the Design with damp fingers. To remove the Design lines after the article is completed, wash in warm water, with soap.
