Head of Southern Railway Overcome by Apoplexy Just After He Rose From Bed in Washington Home.

HE FELL UNCONSCIOUS INTO ARMS OF HIS WIFE

Finley Had Just Returned From His Country Home to Washington-Succeeded Samuel Spencer.

Washington, November 25 .- William Wilson Finley, president of the Southern railway and a leading figure in movements for the development of the south, died here today, as a result of a stroke of apoplexy he suffered a few hours before. He did not regain con-

Mr Finley's family, friends and as sociates were wholly unprepared for his sudden death. Scarcely past the prime of life, he was vigorous and energetic, and seemingly in the best of health, until a moment before he was felled by the stroke. He passed yesterday evening quietly with his family and retired apparently in the best physical and mental condition Fell Into Wife's Arms.

When he arose about 7 o'clock this moining, he casually observed to Mrs. Finley that he had a feeling of slight oppression in his head. She left the room for a moment to obtain some mild caning over a diesser with his head buried in his hands. She attempted to assist him, but he fell into her arms, unconscious

Di Paso, Texas, November 25 -The ederal forces which have engaged General Francisco Villa's rebel troops near Tlerra Blanca for the last two days have been defeated and routed according to an official message sent tonight by General Francisco Villa. commander of the rebel forces, to the rebel chiefs at Juarez

General Villa said in the message that the federal troops were in a disgraceful retreat" to the south, and that his forces had captured all their artillery and three of the seven trains on which they had come to the battle-

Fighting on West Flank.

Fierce fighting was in progress late tonight on the west flank of the rebel troops, south of Juarez, where General Marcelo Curaveo, commander of one of the federal columns, is reported making a desperate attack on this sec-tion of Villas forces in an attempt to oreak through Juarez At the center and east wing of Vil-

# KILLED BY BLACK

Dispute Over fore Coal Train.

Engineer Sidney Leonard, aged 40, married man, living at Inman Yards, was shot to death in a fight with a negro last night as the result of a dispute over a "shaker bar' lying on the tracks on front of a coal train The shooting is said to have been seen by Fireman Donehoo Several negroes also saw the shooting, but as far as is known M: Donehoo is the only white witness The negro, who mad his escape, is said to be Will Ratchford, of 238-B Williams street

According to the version of the affair given county policemen, the engineer, after a few words with the negro, struck him over the head with an iron bolt and knocked him to his knees. As the black fell he jerked out a pistol from his hip pocket and began firing from his kneeling position. Leonard fled at the first shot and died some several hundred feet away. His body was not found for twenty minutes. The negro at once made his escape

County police were notified in a short time, and Desk Sergeant Carroll dispatched seven men to the scene in an attempt to capture the black Patrolmen Baker, Ford, Casey, Walters, Whitford, Alien and Pope scoured the woods around Inman Yards without avail. Other officers were sent to watch the address given on Williams street, where it was believed the negro might seek a change of clothing and money to aid his departure from At-

The police were also seeking to find out the names of all the men alleged to have seen the shooting. First efforts were directed at finding the assailant, and railroad men declared they did not know the names of all who saw the crime.

## ENOUGH POISON TO KILL FIFTY MEN FOUND IN FLOUR

Dr. Edgar Everhart Makes Report to Dr. W. M. Girtman in Alleged Hazlehurst Strychnine Case.

WHOLE FAMILY IS SICK; **HUSBAND UNDER ARREST** 

As Result of Illness of Jesse G. Ross, Patrick Ursery, His Son-in-Law, Is Held for Investigation.

Interest was increased last night in the case of Patrick Ursery, prominent resident of Hazlehurst, Ga. jailed, following the alleged attempt to poison the family of his wife, by the announcement of Dr Edgai Everhart, a state chemist, that poison in quantiies sufficient to poison a half hundred people had been discovered in the food eaten by the family

Haziehurst officials who will prosecute the prisoner have been notified of the discovery. Dr. Everhart stated to a reporter for The Constitution last night that strychnine had been found in both the flour and biscuits which Ursery is suspected of having poi-

Dr W M Girtman, a Hazlehurst physician, who attended the family of Ursery's father-in-law during their mysterious illness that resulted in the husband's arrest, came to Atlanta Tuesday morning with the flour and biscuits. He held a conference with Dr. Everhart, in which he produced a hitherto undisclosed statement from ı Hazlehurst druggist to the effect that, shortly before the poisoning, Ursery had purchased an amount of strychnine.

Dr Everhart will make a quantity analysis some time today in an endeavor to ascertain whether or not the amount of poison in the flour and food was the same as that purchase

Ursery's odse is attracting statewide attention Shortly after his mairiage to a beautiful and attractive faughter of Jesse G. Ross, a wealthy farmer of Hazlehurst, Mr. Ross and his entire family were taken simultaneously ill with poisoning. An investigation was started A sack of flour, from the contents of which biscuits were made for the fatal meal, was sent to Dr. Everhart and resulted in th poison discovery.

Witnesses were found to strange actions of Uisery during the illness of his wife's family He of flour which later revealed

loyalty of his girl wife, who strongly asserts belief in her husband's inno-cence, despite the suspicion that has tightened around him. She visits him frequently, and her loyalty to the suspected man has made him many sup-

S D Dell, a well-known attorncy of Hazlehurst has been engaged as coun-sel for Ursery He has stated that his client is merely a victim of an unfortunate chain of circumstances, and that his prosecutors will later become coninced of his innocence. He scouts the theory that his client had tried to poison his wife's relatives in order to

Dr Evenhart, in talking with a Constitution reporter last night, declared that there was undisputedly chough poison in the flour and food sent him

"It was unevenly distributed," he said, "and this fact no doubt accounts for the survival of the victims. Very little of the mixture would have proved

News of the death of W. W. Finley, president of the Southern railway, will be received with sorrow throughout the country. It is said by those who knew him best that he literally worked himself to death. The intense commercial environment of our age, Moloch-like, demands victims, and President Finley was one of them.

President W. W. Finley succeeded Samuel Spencer as president of the Southern at a time when the railways of this country were confronted by a desperate situation, the joint result of their own folly and the conscienceless raids of demagoguery. Problems of administration and of

finance confronted the new president. During his incumbency the company faced more than one crisis. With rare ability and courage he handled the situation, putting the system on a firm foundation and placing it among the great railroad systems of the

His services were rendered from "love of the day's work" and pride in a task well discharged. He wrought wonderfully well for the railroad development of the south and for the larger development of the section. His vision was broad and he saw the destiny waiting for the great property of which he was for so long the guiding

He will be missed, not only by the company over which he presided with such eminent success, but by the whole country, and especially by the south.

#### THE RAILROADS SHOW CAUSE.

A new epoch for the nation is involved in the hearing, now in process before the interstate commerce commission, over the right of the railroads east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers to make a slight increase in their freight

The other day representatives of the carriers appeared before the commission. They submitted and still are submitting exhaustive data supporting their contention. Their claim is that revenue has run far below expenditure, and that the gap is constantly widening. They point to increased operating expenses, mainly wages. They declare that unless they are granted relief, the safety of life on the rail will be further imperilled and traffic the country over will be penalized. The petition now made is a renewal of efforts several months ago to a similar end, then denied by the commission with authority to reopen at a later date.

The railroads are now in embarrassing plight through their own fault. They have sown the wind. They are reaping the whirlwind. The thing to be remembered is that the country is in danger of reaping the whirlwind along with them, and that steps must be taken accordingly. The era of railroad debauchery is one of the most humiliating chapters in the industrial bistory of America. The juggling of railroads as Wall street pawns, instead of legitimate transportation companies; the diversion of the proceeds of bond and stock issues; financial pyramiding; ignoring of the public and glorification of the financial buccaneer. The counts in the indictment are so familiar that it is needless to recount them to a tired public.

But the railroad chickens have come home to roost and the country generally threatens to be the sufferer. State and federal commissions, mindful of the past, are reluctant to grant authority for increase in tariffs. Investors hold off until they are certain their money will draw reasonable dividends. The railroads find it almost impossible to float their securities save on terms that are usurious. And unless money is forthcoming roadbeds will still further deteriorate, rolling stock will become anti- tail.

quated, motive power will fall and trackage facilities will shrink even beyond their present dangerously inadequate proportions. And any or all of these menaces would be calamities to American business.

That is why the carriers are appealing for authority to make their incomes stable and attractive to investors. The one and only understanding on which such authority. can be forthcoming is that there will be no more of the old disreputable practice of legalized piracy. The interstate and the state commissions must exact definite guarantees to that, end. That done, we believe American business men are, as a body, sufficiently reasonable to protect their own interests by allowing a reasonable advance.

A feature to be remembered is that should these increases be authorized there will be turned loose in all industrial and economic channels in this country a sum estimated at one billion dollars, the amount required to modernize America's railroads, And a billion dollars in circulation at this time means a prosperity as yet unexampled in America's history:

But Atlanta never falls down.

All denominations and people outside of denominations will participate in this enterprise. For the institution will be nondenominational in its matriculation requirements and operations.

The city that raised more than \$70,000 in a day for the Shriners can raise \$180,000 in a few days for Oglethorpe university For 70 Atlantans have already contributed \$70,000. The remainder between that sum and \$250,000 will clinch the opportunity.

Putting out of consideration human anguish, the economic loss there represented is tremendous. It is estimated that nearly or quite a third of these deaths can be prevented. It requires trained intelligence for the work of prevention. The welfare exhibit shows the way to mothers and fathers.

The exhibit also indicates methods for early detection of disease and defects in children. It shows how, by spotting the first symptoms of disease, you can forestall its development, and save money in doctors' bills. If the juvenile diseases that are preventable were held in control in Atlanta the aggregate saving would be hundreds of thousands of dollars each year. The pay envelope of the average wage-earner would be considerably fatter.

The primary appeal of the display is, of course, to those intimate paternal and maternal instincts that want to give the child a square deal. But the financial side is not to be overlooked.

The prevention of sickness is only one of the phases touched by the welfare exhibit. Every father and mother, every citizen of Atlanta has a personal interest in visiting the display that opens on the 1st.

I know of no occupation in which advancement is dependent so much upon merit and so little upon favoritism as in railway work. Railway managements are constantly striving for increased efficiency in all departments. If they are to obtain this it means the filling of the more responsible posts by men who have demonstrated superior qualifications. fications.
Intelligent work means something

who have demonstrated superior qualifications.

Intelligent work means something more than the mere discharge of each day's task in a perfunctory way. A man may discharge his duties so well as never to receive the criticism of his superiors and yet may not be qualified for promotion. He who hopes to get ahead must understand his work in its relation to what the other men in his department and in the other departments of the company are doing. On account of the great variety of work in the operation of a railway its organization is necessarily divided into departments, the functions of which touch at many points, and it is essential to the best results that all departments shall work together as smoothly as the wheels of a watch. If this is to be brought about there must be intelligent team work and loyal cooperation on the part of the individuals in each department and each of them must make the interests of the company his own interests. My advice, therefore, to the man in any department of railway work, who aspires to performing his duties efficiently, he shall, without interfering in any way with the men in other departments, be always ready to give them such help as may be in his power; that he shall learn everything possible about the service as a whole, and that he shall know thoroughly the dutles of the post in his own department immediately ahead of that which he fills so that, when the time comes for his promotion, he shall be in every way qualified to make good in his new and more important field.

#### TURKEY SAUCES.

One of the best measures of a woman's ability as a cook is her ingenuity in serving the food she has prepared. It is a praise-worthy achievement to always be able to send



turkey, but some other well will add zest and relish to the too dry meat of this fowl. One of the most appropriate sauces is made from the giblets; the neck, heart, liver and gizzard are boiled with a pint of water until they become quite tender. Chop these, but discard the neck, strain the liquor in the reasting pan and add it to that the glblets boiled in. Return the chopped meat to this and season. Add butter and cream and

thicken a very little. Celery is delicious with all fowl and sauce from it is rich and piquante; slice four heads of celery in small pieces and boil twenty minutes in salted water. Brown this, but do not let it scorch. As browned flour will thicken othing, dissolve four tablespoons of flour, in little milk, stirring it until a smooth bater results. Add two cups of meat broth point, add the browned flour and butter to the batter of flour and milk and stir this into the boiling broth. If desired, when seasoning, add a little onlon. Put the cold chopped turkey meat in this and cook quickuntil the right thickness. The usual way of serving this is with buttered toast.

Remove the brown skins, again put into boiling water and cook until tender. still hot rub through a coarse sieve or collander. Mix with the sifted nuts a few bread crumbs and two tablespoons of melted buton with salt and pepper, moisten with a little sweet cream and fill the turkey. taking care not to press the dressing in too closely.

#### Potnto Dressing.

Two cups of hot mashed potatoes, yolks of

## The World's Mysteries

WERE THERE WHITE INDIANS?

The North American Indians have been he subject of numerous popular fallacies, some of which have gained worldwide curency. One of the most interesting of these stories is that of the White or Welsh Indians. It is to the effect that the White Indians were the descendants of a colony of Welsh founded about A. D. 1170 by Prince Madoc—well known from Southey's poem. James Mooney, who has made a careful study of the Indian, traces the development of this story from statements in an article in "The Turkish Spy," published in London about 1730.

At first these Welsh Indians, who were subsequently described as speaking Welsh, possessing Welsh Bibles, beads, crucifixes, etc., are placed near the Atlantic coast and identified with the Tuscaroras, an Iroquoian tribe, but by 1776 they had retreated inland to the banks of the Missouri, above St. Louis. A few years later they were far up the

river, continuing as time went on to recede farther and farther westward, being identified successively with the Mandand, in whose language Catlin thought he detected Welsh element; the Moquia Pueblo tribe, northeastern Arizona, and the Modocs. of southwestern Oregon, until at last they vanished over the waters of the Pacific ocean.

The following is an account of these White Indians as given in a narrative of Captain Isaac Stuart, of the Provincial Cavalry of South Carolina in March, 1782. "I was taken prisoner about fifty miles to the west-ward of Fort Pitt about eighteen years ago and carried to the Wabash with other white men. My companions were executed, but I was spared and was taken with an Indian tribe westward, crossing the Mississippi river near the Red river. "Here we came to a nation of Indians

remarkably white and whose hair was of a reddish color, at least, mostly so. They lived on a small river which emptied into the Red river, which they called the River Post. Acompanying our party was a Welshman and, much to the man's amazement, he found this white Indian tribe spoke a language very similar to his own.' Upon inquiry the chief men of the town

When he was with the Chocamong them. When he was with the Choctaws, at the Mississippl river, he went to an Indian town, a very considerable distance from New Orleans, whose inhabitants were of different complexion, not so tawny as those of the other Indians, and who spoke Welsh. He saw a book among them which he supposed was a Welsh Bible, which they

carefully kept wrapped up in a skin, but they could not read it."

At Tuscarora Valley Mr. Beatty claims to have met a man by the name of Levi Hicks, who had been a captive from his youth with the Indians. He said he was once attending an embassy at an Indian town on the west side of the Mississippi, where the inhabitants spoke Weish, as he was told, for he did

not understand them. It is very natural to wonder how these dians, though descended from the Welsh, came by books, for it is well known that the period at which the Welsh must have come to America, was long before printing was discovered or that any writing assumed the form of books as we now have them.

Major Rogers, in his "Concise Account of

North America," published in 1765, notices the White Indians, but the geography of their country he leaves anywhere on the west of the Mississippi, probably never hav-ing visited them himself. There is very lit-tle real foundation for the story of the Welsh or White Indians, and one writer sums is up as follows: "Upon the whole, we think it may be pretty safely said, that the existence of a race of Welsh about the regions of the Mississippi does not rest on as good authority as that which has been adduced to establish the existence of the sea-serpent.'
