

RUSS FORCES WIN OVER AUSTRIANS; TWO TOWNS TAKEN

French Advance in Argonne and Alsace, But There Is Little Change Elsewhere on Western Front.

HARD FIGHT CONTINUES ALONG THE RIVER PILICA

German Attacks on Bzura and Rawka Rivers Being Made With Artillery—Czar Is at Front.

London, December 27.—Except in the Argonne and Alsace, where the French have made some progress, the battles in the west for the last two days largely consisted of Russian attacks, to counter those of the allies and to prevent the allies from organizing the ground they had gained.

AUSTRIANS ROUTED; GERMANS CHECKED.

Petrograd, December 27.—The following official communication was issued from general headquarters today: "During December 26 the fighting along the lines near Bzura and Pilica was confined in general to artillery fire. We have repulsed with success various attacks by the Germans."

AUSTRIANS WAGING DESPERATE FIGHT.

Reut. B., December 27.—Among items given out today by the official press bureau are the following: "While the Germans are reported to be advancing on the Bzura and along the Pilica rivers, the Austrians appear to be having a hard struggle to maintain their positions east of the Dunajec river. They seem to be holding their own, however, on the lower reaches and also in the adjoining ground steadily in the Carpathians."

MLAWA RECAPTURED BY GERMAN FORCES.

Paris, December 27.—French aviators have bombarded the aviation hangars at Mlawka, in retaliation for the bomb attack on Nancy by German Zeppelins, according to the official communication issued in Paris this afternoon. The communication also states that the Germans have re-occupied the city of Mlawka in Russian Poland.

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KING TO URGE USE OF "MINUTE MEN"

Wants to Place Motorcycle Policemen in Each of the Fire Engine Houses of Atlanta.

Conforming to plans which he has been preparing to make Atlanta the best policed city in the United States, Police Commissioner Andy R. King has asked the police department to make an estimate covering the cost of adding thirty more men to the present force.

These men will be known as the "minute men" of the department. They will be equipped with motorcycles and will be stationed two at each firehouse in the city. Commissioner King has mapped out plans whereby the men will be on duty twenty-four hours of each day.

Secretary W. C. Morris is preparing an estimate of the cost of maintaining and equipping the additional men. Commissioner King believes that his plan can be carried out at a cost of about \$60,000 a year to the city.

Plans Will Not Conflict. Commissioner King says that his plans will not conflict with the plans of Chief Beavers, which provide for the establishment of four sub-stations and the appointment of forty additional patrolmen.

My idea, explains the commissioner, "is to make it possible for the city to give relief in the way of police protection to every section of the city, and to give that relief immediately. The sub-station scheme is a good one, but I doubt if the finance committee of council, with its limited means of supplying the wants and needs of the various city departments, will be able to supply the four stations at the first of the year."

Cost of Sub-Stations. According to estimates which have been made at different times since the sub-station idea originated, it will cost the city in the neighborhood of \$150,000 to purchase the land and erect the buildings. One station has been suggested for the north side in the neighborhood of Piedmont avenue and Tenth street, another on Marietta street, in the neighborhood of the stock yards, one in the West End neighborhood and the fourth to be on the south side section of the city.

Further discussing his plan, Commissioner King says: "Since outlining my plans for placing on duty a permanent emergency squad to give protection to every section of the city, I have received a great deal of encouragement from people living in various parts of the city. I think my plan answers every demand that has been made on the police board to give protection to every section of the city, and since I have made a study of the locations of the various fire stations of the city I am more convinced than ever that the plan will work out successfully."

With two men on duty at each station, the strain on the call squad at central headquarters will be lessened. If all the call men at the headquarters are out on duty, an urgent call for police comes from out on Peachtree street, all the desk sergeants will have to do is to communicate with the call men at the station on West Peachtree street, and they will be on the scene within five minutes, at least, after receiving the call. If an arrest is made the men can carry the prisoners back to the fire house if it is located nearby, or hold them at the scene until the wagon arrives.

Too Long to Reach Scene. "From my observations of robberies reported recently, I have reached the conclusion that many burglars have escaped arrest just because there were no policemen within easy reach. Often burglars are detected at work in houses, but at the time a policeman is on the long trip from headquarters on Decatur street to the scene, the burglars have been frightened away from their work, and have left the neighborhood long before the police arrive."

I believe for a certainty that by putting these men at the fire-stations, the police board will make it impossible for burglars to operate, in fact it will be the same as putting down all other disorders which frequently occur in neighborhoods."

Commissioner King suggested the plan of putting the vice squad on duty along with the recently appointed supernumeraries. These men have been assigned to work in the residential sections of the north and south sides of the city, and since they have been on duty it is said that police headquarters has been decreased and a number of arrests have been made by the men.

More than fifteen members of the new plan have been spoken to about Commissioner King's suggestion, and they say that they will support the police board when the plan is placed before the finance committee next year.

ISLAND-FOR-GUNS TRADE CATEGORICALLY DENIED

Official German Report Branded False by Russia and Japan.

Petrograd, December 27.—The Russian government has authorized the official news agency to deny categorically the statement that Russia has pledged to Japan half the island of Sakhalin in exchange for heavy artillery. It is asserted the report is absolutely unfounded.

An item given out by the German press bureau at Berlin, December 26, said reports had been received from Copenhagen that Russia had traded half of Sakhalin to Japan for heavy guns.

Washington, December 27.—The Japanese embassy announced today that a statement made Saturday by a secretary, taken to mean that the embassy had official confirmation of press dispatches that the Russian half of Sakhalin had been turned over to Japan was misinterpreted. It was declared the dispatches were unfounded.

LONE TURK WHIPPED RUSSIAN SQUADRON; IS OFFICIAL CLAIM

Constantinople, December 28.—(Via London, 3:38 a. m.)—An official communication issued Sunday says: "The Turkish forces are victorious, advancing along the Caucasian front. There is no truth in the Russian official report that Hamidieh has been torpedoed at Sebastopol. The Turkish fleet, including the Hamidieh, steamed through Black sea, and returned without damage."

OCCUPATION OF AVLONA HAS CAUSED NO PROTEST

Rome, December 27.—None of the powers has protested against the Italian occupation of Avlona, Albania, and the hope generally is expressed here that no complications will arise which will force Italy to abandon neutrality.

Palermo, Sicily, December 27.—(Via Rome.)—A regiment of sharpshooters have left for Avlona, Albania, to replace the bluejackets who took possession of the port last week.

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CONGRESS INTENDS TO HASTEN LABORS TO RUSH NECESSARY WORK AND AVERT EXTRA SESSION.

Opposition Is Growing to Literacy Test.

Washington, December 27.—With leaders in both houses determined to push through all necessary legislation and avert an extra session after March 4, congress will reconvene Tuesday after one of the shortest holiday recesses on record.

The appropriation bills and general measures are expected to be cleared up quickly by the house. The senate, however, still has before it practically the entire legislative program outlined at the reopening of the session by the president, in addition to the immigration bill and the appropriation measures.

There is a growing disposition on the part of some democrats to sidetrack the immigration bill or to defeat it. Senator Lowry, after a recent conference with the president, threw down the gauge of battle over the literacy test issue which the president opposes.

Some senators believe enough votes can be found to strike out the prohibition amendment, which is admitted would operate to defeat the bill entirely. Senator Smith, of South Carolina, chairman of the immigration committee, proposes, however, to keep up the fight for the bill, literacy test and all.

Stirring debate that will rival in enthusiastic interest the fight last week over the prohibition amendment is expected soon after January 1, when a bill will be reported for consideration in the house of a resolution for submission of a constitutional amendment for woman suffrage.

Leaders in both houses also look forward to prolonged discussion over the navy appropriation bill. The conservation legislation included in the legislation program still is in the hands of the senate public lands committee. The government ship purchase bill, reported to the senate before the adjournment, is awaiting an opportunity for discussion.

The postoffice appropriation bill is the pending business in the house, with the Indian, legislative, executive and judicial and the river and harbor appropriation bills following. The house agriculture committee has just completed its agricultural appropriation bill, with a total of \$22,527,732 for the department, and an increase of almost \$2,000,000 over the estimate submitted by the department.

ITALIAN CRUISER TO AID U. S. WARSHIP IN TURKEY

To Take Joint Action Against Further Demonstrations by Turks.

Rome, December 27.—The Italian cruiser Calabria, now at Beirut, Syria, has been instructed to assist the American cruiser North Carolina in the event of any further demonstrations against departure of Europeans from Turkish territory.

The cruiser Tennessee, the fuel ship Vulcan and the gunboat Scorpion, of the American navy, will also be looking after American interests in the eastern Mediterranean, and are ready to steam to any place where they are needed, according to reports received here.

MISS GENEVIEVE CLARK TO WED EDITOR THOMSON

Washington, December 27.—Speaker Champ Clark and Miss Clark tonight announced the engagement of their daughter, Miss Genevieve, to James M. Thomson, editor of The New Orleans Item. The wedding will take place in the spring or early summer at the Clark home in Bowling Green.

APOSTOLIC DELEGATE RECEIVED BY SULTAN

London, December 27.—The new apostolic delegate to Turkey, Monsignor Dolel, was received yesterday by Sultan Mehmed V, according to a Reuters dispatch from Constantinople. Monsignor Dolel is a member of the Italian hierarchy and was appointed by the sultan as an apostolic delegate to Turkey without the intervention of the French ambassador.

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BRITISH WARSHIPS FIGHT ZEPPELINS AND SUBMARINES IN RAID ON GERMAN BASE

Naval Escort of English Air Attack on Cuxhaven Escapes Unharmed by Aerial and Underwater Attack Made by Germans.

BIG BOOST GIVEN TO GIRL CANNERS

General Education Board Reports on Work Directed by Federal Government, But Financed by Board.

New York, December 27.—Results of the Girls' Canning club movement in southern states, promoted jointly by the department of agriculture and the general education board, are detailed in an installment of the latter organization's annual report made public today.

"The method is simple," says the report. "Each girl takes one-tenth of an acre and is taught how to select the seed, to plant, cultivate and perfect the growth of the tomato plant. Monthly reports are made, and the girls are provided, to be set up out of doors in the orchard or the garden, and trained teachers of domestic science instruct the local teachers in the best methods. When the tomatoes are ripe the girls come together, now at one home and now at another, to can the product. It is done in the most up-to-date fashion. The girls are taught the necessity of extreme cleanliness, they sterilize utensils and cans, seal and label, and indeed manufacture an easily marketable product."

Extent of Work. "Three hundred and twenty-five girls were reported in the first year. Three thousand the next, 23,550 in the year following, in 1913 there were upward of thirty thousand in fourteen different states."

The entire expense of the Girls' Canning club work has at all times been borne by the general education board except for local contributions. In 1911 an initial appropriation of \$50,000 was made. Another appropriation of \$25,000 in May, 1913, the appropriation of the board for this purpose was \$75,000.

"Through the national government, through the department of agriculture, and through the control and supervision, it has borne no part of the expense. The states in which the work is now going forward on this basis are Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi, Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, Alabama, Oklahoma and Texas."

Profits in Cash. "The average profit made by the girls reporting in twelve states was \$21.98; but not a few made sums far in excess. A Macon county, (Mississippi), girl realized a net profit just under \$300 on her 550 cans of tomatoes. Another neighbor made 1,008 cans with a profit to herself of \$77.73; a girl living in Aiken county, South Carolina, netted \$60.51. The accounts are carefully kept."

"The innumerable indirect gains are certainly not less important. Canning club day is a social occasion. This social interest is kindled about the doing of something for the good of the school, in the spirit of mutual helpfulness, mutual concern, mutual affection. This sort of thing lays the foundation for co-operation in larger and more important things in the future of the school, in charities, in business."

DESTROYER HITS ROCKS. Crew of British Craft Saved by Lifeboats.

St. Andrews, Scotland, December 27.—(Via London.)—A British torpedo boat destroyer went ashore early today on the coast of Kingsbarns, 6 miles southeast of St. Andrews. Her crew was saved by lifeboats.

The destroyer, steaming south from Aberdeen to the Firth of Forth in the darkness and without lights, struck a rock and was wrecked. The crew of the ship was saved by the lifeboats. The destroyer was a member of the British fleet. The wreck was discovered by a light cruiser and a destroyer force, together with submarines. As these ships were seen by the Germans from Helgoland, two Zeppelins and three or four hostile submarines attacked them.

WOUNDS HINDU SWAMI AND BLOWS SELF UP

San Francisco, December 27.—Louis Vavara, a mystic, blew himself up, wounding a Hindu swami and three disciples and wrecked the temple in which they were worshipping by exploding a bomb at the afternoon service today. All the injured will recover.

Vavara was said tonight by members of the cult to have been demented, but supposedly harmless. Upon entering the temple today he walked across the room and through a line containing the bomb, at the feet of the swami. Nothing happened, so he bounced the bomb three times on the platform ledge. The third time the bomb exploded.

DANCE ENDS IN KILLING; SLAYER MAKES ESCAPE

Tallahassee, Ala., December 27.—(Special.)—News was received here this afternoon that John Wiley shot and instantly killed Roscoe Lee, at Malone, a village some distance from here, this morning. The shooting is said to have taken place at a drunken quarrel at a dance. Wiley is still at large. Both were prosperous farmers of Tallapoosa county.

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ZEPPELINS DRIVEN OFF BY GUNS OF CRUISERS AND SUBMARINES EVADED

Britons Lose One Man and Three Planes in Attempt to Dig Out German Fleet. Metz Is Bombarded by French Aviators.

London, December 27.—The attack of the belligerent countries spent a busy Christmas holiday. While a solitary German flew over the Thames estuary and dropped a single bomb, which fell in a roadway and did no damage, a convoy of seven British navy seaplanes visited the German naval base at Cuxhaven and dropped bombs on ships and the gas works. All but one of the British aviators returned safely to the ships which conveyed them. Similar activity was displayed along the battle front, German aviators paying a surprise visit to Nancy. French aviators to Metz; British to Brussels and other Belgian towns occupied by the Germans, and German aviators to Polish cities.

Assisted by light cruisers, destroyers and submarines, seven British naval aviators, piloting seaplanes, made a daring attack Christmas day on the German naval base at Cuxhaven, at the mouth of the Elbe. Six of the aviators returned safely, but the seventh, Commander Hewlett, it is feared has been lost. His machine was found off Helgoland, wrecked.

What damage was done by the bombs thrown by the attacking party could not be ascertained, but the German report of the affair says the raid was fruitless.

ATTEMPT TO DIG OUT FLEET OF GERMANY.

The enterprise of the British navy in thus attempting to "dig out" the German fleet brought about a battle between the most modern of war machines. The British squadron, including the light cruisers Arctura and Undaunted, which have been engaged in previous exploits on the German coast, were attacked by Zeppelins, seaplanes and submarines.

By raid maneuvering the ships were able to avoid the submarines while the Zeppelins found the fire of the cruisers too dangerous for them to keep up the fight. The German seaplanes dropped bombs, which, according to the British account, fell harmlessly into the sea. The Germans, however, claim to have hit two destroyers and their convoy, the latter being sea ashore.

The British ships remained in the vicinity for three hours without being attacked by any surface warships and the planes. Three others were picked up by submarines, but their machines were sunk. Commander Hewlett, it is thought, was drowned.

BRITONS ATTACKED BY TWO ZEPPELINS.

The official press bureau gave out the following statement today regarding the British raid on the German coast: "On Friday, December 25, the German warships lying off Schilling road off Cuxhaven, were attacked by seven naval seaplanes, piloted by Flight Commanders Oliver, Hewlett, Boss and Kilmartin. The British seaplanes were escorted by a light cruiser and a destroyer force, together with submarines. As these ships were seen by the Germans from Helgoland, two Zeppelins and three or four hostile submarines attacked them."

"It was necessary for the British ships to remain in the neighborhood to pick up the returning aviators, and a novel combat ensued between the most modern cruisers and the enemy's aircraft and submarines. By swift maneuvering the enemy's submarines were avoided and the two Zeppelins were easily put to flight by the guns of the Undaunted and Arctura."

"The enemy's seaplanes succeeded in dropping their bombs near our ships, but without hitting any of them. The British ships remained for three hours off the enemy's coast without being molested by any surface vessels and

A BUSINESS TRAINING.

One of the significant tendencies of American education is to fit the young man or young woman directly for a business career, using the term "business" in a sense other than industry or callings of a technical nature.

Along with other cities, Atlanta has taken cognizance of this national need and done much to supply it in this territory, in the form of commercial branches in the high schools and many privately-conducted business colleges of excellent reputation and equipment.

Another recommendation of a business training is that it is an excellent stepping stone. Many of the men foremost in American finance and commerce started in humble clerical capacities, with an equipment gained in a well-regulated business college.





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GRAND JURY NOT DONE WITH TERRE HAUTE CASE

Mayor and Practically Entire Official Family Indicted in Partial Report.

Indianapolis, Ind., December 27.—When the federal grand jury reconvenes here January 4, election conditions in Terre Haute, it is said, will again be taken up by the jury. The grand jury returned a partial report in which more than 125 men, including Mayor Donn M. Roberts and practically his entire official family, were indicted.

The real story of the alleged conspiracy to corrupt the election merely stated in the indictment is that Federal authorities have indicated that they will not expose their hand until the trial of the mayor and district Attorney Dailey, in personal charge of the investigation, says immunity has been offered to none.

Mayor Roberts is candidate for the democratic nomination for governor in 1915 and has been the democratic leader in Terre Haute only a short time, having risen rapidly in politics. He declares that political enemies have attacked him.

In 1910 he was appointed city engineer of the foreign mission board of the Southern Baptist church here, and carried his state through in the election of 1912. He made the democratic nomination for mayor and was elected. During the voting process he became so pronounced that appeals were made to Governor Stanton to take a hand in the case.

A grand jury investigated the election and indicted Roberts and a number of his supporters. After a sensational trial, during which all male spectators were acquitted for firearms, Roberts was acquitted.

The second day after he became mayor, Roberts and his board of safety were haled into court on a contempt charge over discharge of two patrolmen, but were acquitted. Within a few days the federal grand jury by Federal Judge Anderson for violating a court order regarding sewer work.

The election of last November was declared by Terre Hauteans to have been worse than the election of 1908, and which was the cause of the arrests beginning Christmas night.

The French infantry had watched the action from the trenches and the machine had no sooner touched the ground than the entire line dashed forward. The Saxons from the trenches had been looking on and they came on at double quick to defend the machine. There was an indescribable mêlée for a few minutes in which it was impossible to separate the French and the Germans. Suddenly a squadron of French dragons came into sight from Goda. With lances ready they charged themselves into the fight and put the Saxons to flight. The machine was captured and the infantry charged with the bayonet and took the trenches that commanded the valley of the Suippe.

The Prodigious Problem of Belgium, With a Few Words to the Kind Heart

Famous Writer Becomes a Reporter and Raises the Curtain on Land of Woe—Shows Four Hundred Human Beings Crowded into One Barge, Living on It Like Vermin—Women Beg for a Centime, the Tenth Part of the Plentiful American Penny—This Penny Represents the Price of a Meal, and Those Pleaders Today Receive Neither Meal Nor Penny in the Land That Was Once One of the Most Happy and Prosperous of the Earth.

Arnold Bennett is one of the great of the earth whose name is not in Who's Who. The people who read that publication did not seem to think it necessary to tell anybody about him—because they all must perforce know it—even likely that he has been heard of in Indiana, the state whose authors are common as jack rabbits are in Texas.

But whether you know about Mr. Bennett, or have previously read any of the works of the most prolific literary man of his day, by all means read his contribution to Belgium. When you are through you will have seen a four-month old fact in a new light.

On a day in last month the loading of the ship *Mansuequa* was finished in New York. She is a 100 ft steamer, over 300 feet in length, and her freight was 5,000 tons of foodstuffs.

This cargo was packed and stowed with such skill as to arouse special admiration not only in New York, but in Europe. Captain McCardi has a detailed plan of all of it, so as to facilitate unloading. Captain McCardi, who has never sailed for European waters before, cast off his moorings amid the acclamations of a people.

His first voyage across the Atlantic was full of adventure and peril, and once, owing to stress of weather, he had to lay to in midocean for several days. At length he arrived at the Hook of Holland, and the news that his ship was sighted threw the whole city of Rotterdam into a vast fest.

The American naval attaché from Berlin traveled to Rotterdam to meet this wondrous ship, and other American diplomatic officials joined him. Before the vessel was made fast to the pier, four hundred American ladies had jumped aboard and started the work of unloading. They worked day and night for fifty hours, and finally surpassed all the records of the port.

And while they toiled, speeches were made, full of enthusiasm and gratitude, banquets were held, and the burghomasters of Rotterdam invited all the official world to be his guests amid the music of the American national anthem. Everybody left with deep emotion that a tremendous international deed of charity was being accomplished.

In due course the ship was emptied and the canal barges were filled; and the ship departed again, while the canal barges, drawn by express tugs and manned by crews, each individual of whom had a special pass from the German authorities, swung forward with the 3,500 tons of bacon, rice, beans and flour for Hamburg, Charleroi, Moss, Ghent and other ports. Representatives of American good will were ready to distribute it. The vast business was successfully done.

But let it be noted that M. Rolin, the Belgian official who in the speaking-making at Antwerp returned thanks to America on behalf of Belgium, uttered these words:

It suggests, as the most practical and the most effective method of help, that all local associations and districts should spend their funds in buying foodstuffs for their own localities, and should then distribute them to their own people.

10,000 TONS DAILY IS EXTENT OF STEEL'S RISE

20,000 Tons Against 10,000 in November—Agricultural Implement Material Booming.

New York, December 27.—Although permission to advance freight rates 5 per cent in the eastern territory did not bring out an immediate response from the railroads, in larger measure because of the fact that in general they bought more freely of rolled, cast and forged steel and iron, and the prospect for larger contracts for rails, cars, locomotives and bridge work was generally bright. The demand for agricultural implement material is booming.

The extent of the improvement in the market is shown by the fact that the orders booked by the subsidiary companies of the steel corporation last week averaged 20,000 tons per day, against average daily bookings in November of less than 10,000. At the same time, the steel corporation's operations were dropped from 42 per cent to scarcely 25 per cent of ingot capacity, which means that shipments were reduced proportionately, giving a gain in unshipped orders not strictly in line with the increase in business.

At the same time profits were not commensurate with the larger tonnage booked. Buying was generally at the expense of the mills, as the price of orders were sold as low as \$3 per base box, or \$4 per ton under the fixed price, to ordinary buyers for shipment over the first half of 1915. Yet the larger general tonnage booked will help the mills to eliminate the loss prices recently prevailing early in 1915.
