

ALL THE RADIUM SUPPLY CONTROLLED BY EUROPE

Director Holmes Says Americans Failed to Recognize Importance of Radium.

Washington, March 22.—How the American people failed to recognize the importance of radium as a cancer cure until European countries had obtained virtually all of the present available supply, is graphically told in the annual report of Joseph A. Holmes, director of the federal bureau of mines, made public tonight.

Director Holmes estimates that "in the United States 75,000 persons die each year from cancer." Explaining that radium is considered the most promising cure for certain types of cancer, the director says the most serious barrier to progress in demonstrating this is the scarcity of radium.

"There probably is not more than thirty grams of radium now available for use in such treatment in all countries," the report says. "Of this amount here probably is not more than two grams of radium bromide in the United States, in the hands of a few surgeons."

"During 1912 there was a total production of 2,110 tons of radium-bearing ores in the United States of which about 45 per cent of the ores and a little more than 50 per cent of the radium content were shipped abroad."

"No detailed information concerning the preventing unnecessary waste of the radium-bearing ores being obtainable, the bureau of mines has endeavored to develop a procedure which, if successful, will be made public for general use. Progress in this work has been slow. It is believed that with large facilities made available the bureau can extract from ores already belonging to the government a quantity of radium in excess of the quantity of the public health service at its various hospitals, will in part serve to meet the needs of the various cancer hospitals of the country."

Referring to the bureau's activities in preventing unnecessary waste of the nation's mineral resources, Director Holmes says that last year there was saved in Oklahoma alone \$10,000,000 worth of natural gas. The waste of this product that still continues annually in Oklahoma is estimated to be from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000, and in all the fields of the country it reaches a total of \$60,000,000.

The director estimates the unnecessary waste of coal at 250,000,000 tons annually. He expresses the opinion that an investigation costing probably \$50,000 would result in a saving of 20,000,000 tons yearly.

NEW BASIS IS COMING FOR COTTON MARKET

Trade Is Able to Figure Fairly Accurately Supply Available for Mills.

New Orleans, La., March 22.—The cotton market this week will get down to a new basis. All of the reports concerning growth this season are out of the way and the trade is able to figure out fairly accurately the supply available for the mills of the world.

While it is yet too early for weather markets, more or less influence will come from the weather over Texas. Delay already has been reported in getting the crop out of the ground in the southern counties of the state because of too low temperatures and it even has been reported that some young cotton has been killed by the cold.

The spot demand and end of March export shipments will be features of interest this week. Exports thus far this season of American cotton total 7,400,000 bales, against 6,991,123 a year ago, and 4,677,322 two years ago.

FARM PRODUCTS DIRECT TO DOOR OF CONSUMER

By Parcel Post Postmaster General Burleson Will Cut Living Cost.

Washington, March 22.—Preliminary steps were taken by the postoffice department today to perfect its plan for reducing the cost of living by having the parcel post carry farm products direct to the door of consumer. Ten cities were selected to begin the work of establishing direct connections between the producer and consumer. Postmaster General Burleson already having issued an order permitting the use of crates and boxes for butter, eggs, poultry, vegetables and fruit shipped by parcel post.

Orders were sent to the postmasters at Boston, Atlanta, St. Louis, San Francisco, Baltimore, Detroit, La Crosse, Wis., Lynn, Mass., Rock Island, Ill., and Washington, D. C., to receive the names of persons who are willing to supply farm produce in retail quantities by parcel post. Printed lists of these names will be distributed among town and city patrons.

The One Thing Necessary.

The postmaster general is convinced that this plan is the one thing necessary to enable the people of this country to enjoy the potential benefits of the parcel post. No one ever has questioned the possibility of reducing the cost of living by establishing direct relations between the ultimate consumer and the original producer. The only reason for such direct transportation was provided for the first time by the establishment of the domestic parcel post. Since that time has been lacking an agency by means of which the individual producer could come in touch with the individual consumer.

The postmaster general's plan is designed to provide this agency for the most essential of all products—those products which are consumed in the home and in the kitchen.

FATE OF THE NEW HAVEN RESTS WITH ITS OWNERS

Washington, March 22.—With the danger of an antitrust suit out of the way, the fate of the New Haven railroad system must be taken by the New Haven directors. A meeting of the directors is expected out New England and by the Massachusetts legislature. Department of Justice officials have agreed to a general dissolution, and the feeling here is that the salvation of the road is in the hands of its directors and stockholders. The new board is expected to meet in New York Thursday, and at that time the agreement between the directors and the department, announced last night, will be considered. Chairman Elliott is confident that the directors will approve the action taken here by himself and counsel, and with their approval he believes the agreement can be submitted to the stockholders and ratified within a month.

Action by Massachusetts will be necessary before trustees named in the agreement to take over the Boston and Maine stock of the New Haven can begin the work of liquidating the stock. Legislation removing the lien which that commonwealth has over the stock will be necessary before the plan is worked out.

The final step in the dissolution will be taken in New York after the New Haven stockholders and the state of Massachusetts have acted, when lawyers for the government and the railroad will appear before the United States district court and ask for an agreed decree embodying the terms of the agreement announced here.

Pending submission of the plan to stockholders and action in Massachusetts, department attorneys probably will give some attention to the preparation of this decree. It probably will not be completed for several weeks, and will not be finally approved by both sides until the necessary legislation has been signed by Governor Walsh.

WESLEY FOUNDATION FOR STATE UNIVERSITY

Chicago, March 22.—A gift to the University of Illinois of a farm of 30 acres on behalf of the Wesley foundation, was announced today. Wesley foundation, created at the university by Illinois Methodists, is intended to be one of a series of similar foundations at the state university.

Kendrick, of North McDuffie. They were bought by J. F. Watson, and shipped to the market. The steers were in the best of health and in excellent condition. It is said that Mr. Kendrick has over fifty head of steers that will be ready for market next year.

COVINGTON MAN KILLS HIS WIFE BY ACCIDENT

Gun Is Fired as Bun Johnson Rushes to Kill Hawk.

Covington, Ga., March 22.—(Special.)—While passing through the kitchen of his home at Covington this morning on his way to play a hawk, which had pounced down upon a brood of chickens, Bun Johnson, a farmer living five miles from this place, accidentally killed his pretty young wife when the gun was unaccountably discharged in his hands.

She died instantly. A coroner's inquest was held a few hours later. Following Johnson's version of the tragedy, he was acquitted by a verdict of accidental death.

The entire left side of the dead woman was mangled by the load of buckshot. She was standing with her back to the doorway, through which her husband was passing, when the gun accidentally exploded. She was 35 years old, and leaves one child.

WORLDLINGS USING BIBLE, SAYS SHULER, FOR SELFISH ENDS

Rev. Allen C. Shuler, of the East Side Tabernacle, in a sermon last night on "Undeclared and Unacknowledged Claims that the Light and Liberty of the Gospel is being used today by worldlings for purposes that have left God out."

"Why, then, United States," said the pastor, "can you but down as a Christian nation. Daniel Webster, it is said, tried to prove that proposition and had to acknowledge his failure.

Unfaithfulness, lack of consecration and separation is the curse of modern Christianity and has been from the beginning. We need a ministry of 'Come ye forth from among them, who use nothing else in the church today.'

SPALDING TO UNDERTAKE CULTIVATION OF BAMBOO

Griffin, Ga., March 22.—(Special.)—The discovery that bamboo will grow in Spalding county may lead to the establishing of a new industry here. The Griffin-Spalding County Board of Trade is behind the project, and an effort will be made to have the growers of this plant enter into competition with the supply imported from Japan.

Some months ago Mrs. G. L. A. Devotte planted some bamboo roots for ornamental purposes. Only very ordinary care was given the plants, but in a short while they have grown to a large size and appear perfectly adapted to this section.

Attention has been called to the fact that American manufacturers are yearly importing large quantities of bamboo canes from Japan for broom handles, and paying a good price for them. Now, since it has been discovered that the plant will grow here, it is a ready market can be found for the product. Spalding county farmers are considering the proposition with interest. The Griffin-Spalding County Board of Trade offers to assist planters in getting a supply of roots.

SPRING TEMPERATURES TO RETURN THIS WEEK

Washington, March 22.—A gradual return this week to normal spring temperatures, with generally fair skies, was predicted by the weather bureau today for all parts of the country east of the Rocky mountains.

"There will be frosts the first part of the week, however," said the bulletin, "and the weather will be generally clear, except southern Florida.

"There is nothing to indicate marked storm activity for the country. A disturbance of moderate intensity will appear in the northwest Wednesday or Thursday, and will move eastward Friday and the eastern states near the end of the week; this disturbance will be attended by local areas of precipitation and be followed by a chance to colder weather in the northern states."

False Rumor Accused Teacher of Killing Young Pupil in Well

Thomasville, Ga., March 22.—(Special.)—As an example of how far a rumor can go, the story is told that a teacher in the Thomas county schools, thinks he has recently had an experience which is almost the limit.

The story in question was to the effect that one of the most valued and reliable of the young women teachers in the county had, in the attempt to punish a pupil, pushed him into the well of the schoolhouse and killed him. Report also said that the teacher had been arrested and was now in jail. SOME TRAGIC FEATURES MARK WELLESLEY FIRE

Wellesley, Mass., March 22.—Some tragic features of the fire that consumed College hall last Tuesday became known today when it was announced that the fire was caused by a special research in the sciences which had attracted international attention, had been destroyed. All notes, specimens and apparatus used in original investigations in the fields of zoology, histology and embryology were lost, college officials saying it is probable that some of the experiments never can be repeated.

For six years Professor Marion E. Hubbard had devoted her energies to the study of the life history of the beetle. The work meant the building up of a new strain of a certain species of beetle, and the carrying on a long series of generations. In view of the increasing interest in eugenics, scientists are aware that the results will be of great value, but the specimens, men notes and apparatus were swept away.

Another loser was Professor Robertson, head of the zoology department. She had about completed her work in the systematic identification of a large number of specimens of brozoa, rare deep-sea forms dredged from the depths of the seven seas by the famous Albatross expedition, and sent her for identification. Not one of the specimens or notes was saved.

The fruit fly's "years" experiments with the brains of ants by Professor Caroline B. Thompson, of the zoology department, were lost.

UNITED STATES WOOL NOT WELL HANDLED

Washington, March 22.—American wool growers could add as much as 3 cents a pound to the value of their product if sent to market graded and put up as attractively as Australian wools, according to estimates of the department of agriculture experts. The department, admitted by the growers themselves and by dealers and manufacturers, said a department study of the wool of the American system of grading and putting up wool is poor.

Three cents a pound on wool selling at from 15 to 30 cents a pound, it was pointed out, is a very high percentage of loss. The bureau of animal industry has prepared a collection of American and Australian wools for use in educational work in this direction and the department hopes that within the next decade sheep-railers will add 10 per cent or more to their returns through improved business practices.

OUTRAGES BY BRIGANDS INCREASING IN CHINA

Pekin, March 22.—Outrages by brigands in central China are assuming alarming proportions. Several hundred associates with the notorious outlaw, White Wolf, are ravaging various parts of the country, ruthlessly murdering and robbing the people and burning property.

The latest bandit exploit was the murder of a notable who seized their entrance into an important market town close to Ssanggangfu, a province east of the town. The town was burned and the population ruined financially. On the occasion of the robbery, the brigands held out hope that the province of Honan, the local troops made no effort to resist the brigands. The troops were commanded by a general, formerly a notable, but the government is unable to deal with the situation and there is every prospect of further development of brigandage.

The revolutionary element is still strong throughout the country. Arrests and executions are frequent. The entire northern army soon will be employed in the suppression of brigandage.

The demonstration was remarkable for the small number of police present, and for the religious atmosphere surrounding it. Only occasionally were speakers interrupted by cheering and calls for "social revolution."
