

WIDOW OF GUNMAN CONNECTS BECKER WITH MURDER PLOT

Mrs. "Lefty Louie" Swears His Name Was Used When Husband Was Urged to Join Conspiracy.

PROOF BEYOND DOUBT, DECLARES WHITMAN

"I Lied Before to Save the Man I Loved From the Electric Chair," Declares Widow on Stand.

New York, May 15.—Mrs. Lillian Rosenberg, the young widow of Lefty Louie, one of the gunmen executed for the part they played in the murder of Herman Rosenthal, today was a witness for the state at the trial of Charles Becker, charged with being the instigator of the plot her husband helped to carry out.

Mrs. Rosenberg appeared to be on the verge of collapse, but she grasped the arms of the witness chair and quickly regained control of her emotions.

Discounts "Confession." Mrs. Rosenberg's statements discount the confession alleged to have been made by "Dago Frank" Cirofici, just before the gunmen were executed.

The state said it expected to complete its case Monday, to which date the case was adjourned.

Martin T. Manton, chief counsel for Becker, after the adjournment, stated that when the prosecution closed its case Monday that of the defense would be closed by Thursday night.

Yalton Sticks to Story. Harry Yalton, alleged fellow conspirator with "Bald Jack" Rose and others in what the state declares was a plot to murder Rosenthal, underwent the ordeal of cross-examination.

In direct examination today Yalton corroborated the main points of Jack Rose's story, and was then turned over to the defense.

Newspaper Man Questioned. The first witness at the afternoon session was Isaac D. White, employed by a New York newspaper.

White said that Becker and his lawyer, John Hart, called on him and asked to see an affidavit Rosenthal had turned over to the paper, in which Becker was charged with being a grafter.


RAILROAD MAN HIT BY TRAIN HE WAS WATCHING PASS BY

REPORTED TO FUNSTON THAT TROOPER WAS SHOT AND HIS BODY BURNED

Brazilian Minister in Mexico Reports That American Infantryman Who Strayed Into the Federal Lines Has Been Executed.

Washington, May 15.—The United States today demanded of the Huerta government news of the fate of Private Parks, the American infantryman who strayed into Mexican lines near Vera Cruz, declaring that unless information about him was given immediately the American government would consider that "an unfriendly and hostile act" had been committed in violation of the understanding for a cessation of hostilities pending mediation.

FEELING STRONG IN UNITED STATES

The American government cabled the Brazilian minister to inform the Huerta government of the strong feeling of the United States in the matter, directing him to make vigorous representations concerning the incident.

NO COMMUNICATION TO THREE MEDIATORS

The three South American mediators had received no communication from the United States about the Parks incident, and persons in the confidence of the president said the affair probably would not interfere with the beginning of the mediation proceedings, though it was recalled in many quarters that the United States accepted the tender of good offices with the reservation that no hostile acts toward Americans should occur while negotiations were in progress.

### LEHON CONTEMPT TRIAL IS POSTPONED BY HILL

#### Detective, in Answer, Explains Why Negro Witness Was Taken Away.

Dan S. Lehon, the William J. Burns aide, fled with his attorneys yesterday an explanation of his action in removing Annie Maud Carter, the negro woman witness in the Frank case from the jurisdiction of Fulton county superior court.

Lehon appeared before Judge Ben Hill Friday morning to answer to the demand to show cause why he should not be adjudged in contempt of court for the removal of the Carter woman. The hearing was postponed indefinitely on account of the sudden illness of Judge Hill.

Lehon asserts in his reply that the order citing him to court defines no matters which are alleged to have taken place in the court, and that no judgment, process or action of the court has been disobeyed by him or his agents.

Objection is made to the statement that the Carter woman was dispatched from the city for "the purpose of otherwise impeding, hindering or delaying the court in the fair, impartial and just administration of the law" on the ground that the language is too indefinite and uncertain.

Lehon declares that he is not guilty in any intent of the offense of contempt of court, and avers that his action in removing the woman was to insure her presence in the court at the proper time and to prevent her from being coerced or violently treated by the police and detectives.

Lehon is represented by the firm of Little, Powell, Hooper, & Burns, Judge Arthur Powell, of this firm, represents his chief, William J. Burns. Frank Hooper, also a member of this firm, assisted General Henry M. Dorsey last summer in the prosecution of Leo Frank. Detective Burns has not yet returned to the city. He is remaining at the bedside of his wife, who, according to reports from New York, is critically ill.

On Saturday afternoon the graduating exercises will be held. There will be an exposition of the industrial work of the school, the students will show how they are taught in manual training, sewing, laundry work, house planning and furnishing, home management, gardening, etc.

Diplomas will be conferred upon fourteen young women, the first graduating class of the school, which was founded four years ago, and has been successfully connected in connection with the Berry School for Boys. The latter institution has had a prosperous existence of thirteen years.

The closing exercises will take place on Sunday, and consist of a baccalaureate sermon by Dr. G. G. Snyder, of Rome, and the final work of the Y. W. C. A.

### Cordele Church Sold.

The price paid was \$2,500.

Cordele, Ga., May 15.—(Special).—Crisp county superior court continues in regular session next Monday, the 18th instant, and will be presided over by Judge W. P. George. There are some interesting cases docketed for trial, both civil and criminal.

### DOPE FIEND FIGHTS OFFICERS IN COURT TO SECURE COCAINE

A sensation was started in police court Friday morning when a dope fiend, upon being brought before Judge Nash Broyles for trial, seized a small box of powdered dope, which lay upon the judge's desk as evidence, and fought desperately with half a dozen court deputies for a sniff of cocaine before he was overpowered and the cocaine taken from him.

W. J. Myers, 32 years old, claiming to be a druggist of Lakewood Heights, the disturber of the court, was bound over under \$500 bond for vagrancy.

Emanuel Ware, a negro, arrested by Officers Poston and Myers, is being held for investigation as a seller of cocaine, upon the charge of the officer that he sold the dope to Myers.

Ware claims that he bought the dope from a negro and that the police are searching for the woman.

Payne's pistol, which was stolen some time Wednesday night, was found on Dobbs, but he claimed that another negro, Alonzo Smith, had given the revolver to him. Smith was then arrested and now both negroes will be tried on the charge of stealing a policeman's pistol.

The loss of many valuable articles was reported by the Davis Jewelry company, 220 Decatur street, Friday morning. The burglar entered the front door of the jewelry shop some time Thursday night.

### AUGUSTA NEGROES WORK SLICK SCHEME

Augusta, Ga., May 15.—(Special).—Augusta negroes have discovered an easier way to make money than by working for it. An extensive plan for defrauding benefit insurance companies has come to light by the arrest of two negro physicians, charged with signing false certificates regarding illness of negro patients.

Local insurance agents claim that since the first of January, between 500 and 600 claims have been paid weekly to negroes for sickness, aggregating, at \$5 each, to the neighborhood of \$3,000 weekly.

### INTEREST IN EFFORT TO SAVE NICK WILBURN

#### Petitions Being Circulated in Both Jones and Bibb Counties.

Macon, Ga., May 15—(Special)—Macon is taking a great interest in the fight to save the life of Nick Wilburn, the youth who is sentenced to die May 19 in Jones county unless executive clemency is granted by Governor Slaton. Petitions are in circulation both in Bibb and Jones counties and are being liberally signed, more than 600 signatures having been secured in Jones county. Those who are signing the petitions take the position that Wilburn should not be made to die in the penitentiary for the crime alone, since Mrs. Kate King, widow of James King the Jones county farmer, who testified against the death of her husband that she plotted the death of Wilburn, has been turned loose. The petitions ask the governor to commute the sentence of death imposed by Judge Parks of the Gemulgee circuit, to life imprisonment. Wilburn claims that he was completely under the domination and control of Mrs. King when he committed the crime she having hypnotized him. The public opinion is leaning toward doing for Wilburn because of his youth and his apparent insanity at the time he killed King.

### Macon Home Burned.

Macon, Ga., May 15—(Special)—The home of Dan O'Connell, on Summit avenue, in north Macon, was destroyed by fire at 7 o'clock this morning, practically all of the contents of the house being burned. The loss will amount to about \$5,000.

### City Protestants Deny the Bill.

Macon, Ga., May 15—(Special)—Just when it began to look like Dr. O. C. Gibson, former city physician, had the city tight relative to his claim for \$2,000 for treating city smallpox patients at the county penitentiary, the city council has taken a different attitude. The city council has apparently put one over on the doctor or rather on his attorneys. Recently Dr. Gibson was awarded a judgment of \$75,000 against the city on a bill for \$2,000 for treating one smallpox patient at the county penitentiary. It is his intention to sue separately on each claim he having about fifteen or twenty city claims. Before paid the amount of the judgment, together with interest and costs, and now he sets up the city as a bar to further suits by Dr. Gibson. It is claimed that the code of Georgia supported by decisions of the supreme court holds that a contract cannot be sued on in part where it is a contract of the nature alleged by Dr. Gibson. It is claimed by City Attorney Deane that Dr. Gibson should have sued for the full amount of the claim and when he elected to sue for only part of it he is estopped from recovering further judgment. At the beginning of the year Dr. Gibson resigned as city physician but through agreement with the city and health department he has continued to treat smallpox patients during the month of January and at the end of that time rendered a bill for about \$2,000 twice as much as he had formerly received for a full year's work as smallpox physician. The city protested the bill but Dr. Gibson claimed no price had been agreed on when he was told to proceed with the work.

### TO SHARE IN ESTATE OF FATHER HE KILLED

New York, May 15—The million-dollar estate of General Hiram Duryea, who was killed in the battle of Gettysburg, will be divided among his three children, the paroled share equally with his brother Henry E. Duryea and his sister Mrs. Henry O. Anderson according to friends of the family yesterday. It is generally believed that the general had planned to have made known his plans for the disposition of his property to his son Chester Duryea, who was indicted in Brooklyn Saturday for a three-year murder for the death of his father. It is believed that the supreme court will be asked to appoint a committee to administer his share of the estate.

### SMITH AND WEST DEBATE ON CONVICT-MADE GOODS

#### Measure Referred to Manufacturers' Committee Despite Opposition by Sen. Smith.

By John Corrigan, Jr. (Special)—Washington, May 15—(Special)—Both Senators Hoke Smith and W. E. West took an active part in the senate debate today over the exclusion of convict-made goods and pauper-made goods from this country. The measure referred for consideration to the finance committee of which he is a member. ### WAR DEPARTMENT ASKS \$50,000 APPROPRIATION

Washington, May 15—A supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 for army, medical and hospital supplies "to meet emergency conditions now existing or likely to arise in the near future" has been asked by the war department today by the war department. Secretary Garrison said the money was needed to cover extraordinary expenditures incidental to the occupation of Vera Cruz and to mobilization of troops for service. The war department was barely sufficient for ordinary conditions and all has been expended or obligated, he said. Additional funds of \$50,000, he said, are now needed to meet other contingencies of medical relief under extraordinary conditions which actually exist or are imminent.

Washington, May 15—Democratic economists of the house including Representative Baughman of Indiana, chairman of the house printing committee were stirred today over the appearance of a special edition of the Congressional Record containing information Senator La Follette, of Wisconsin, desired published on the question of the tariff. The special edition contained 368 pages and was devoted to communication of the tariff. The committee was divided on the question inserted as remarks by the Wisconsin senator. Senator Baughman told the house that the publication meant a total cost to the taxpayers of the country of \$12,760.

### JAPANESE OFFICER HELD FOR SMUGGLING

Seattle Wash., May 15—Noguchi Kamasaku, an officer on the Japanese steamship Awa, was arrested yesterday on an indictment returned by the federal grand jury charging him with smuggling three of his countrymen into the United States. It is alleged that the Japanese were taken aboard at Yokohama, brought here as stowaways and on the night of April 8 were thrown overboard and left to swim ashore. One of the stowaways is reported to have informed government officials that when he was taken on deck his hands were tied before he was thrown overboard and he was drowned. Several bodies with hands tied have been found floating in the vicinity of the dock at various times.


