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RAPS COLLEGES FOR TRUCKLING TO "IRON MASTER"

Kansas City, Mo., May 22.—Branding Andrew Carnegie as an atheist, the Rev. T. S. Clyde, D. D., president of Austin college, Sherman, Texas, started an educational conference of the general conference of the Presbyterian Church in the United States (southern) tonight by calling shame on those colleges which he said "had truckled to the iron master."

"Correspondence with the man convinces me he is an absolute atheist," he said, "and yet he controls the educational system in the United States. All ecclesiastical connections must be severed and the man who has truckled to the iron master must be expelled from the school."

"Those state institutions which may say they are sorry they cannot teach religion in their class rooms are not free thinkers; rather they are slaves of the almighty dollar."

CONSUL SILLIMAN, REPORTED KILLED, IS SAFE IN MEXICO

He Arrives in Mexico City From Saltillo and Will Begin Trip to United States Today.

Washington, May 22.—The Mexican negotiations at Niagara Falls received the earnest attention of administration officials throughout the day. Several exchanges occurred between the American delegates and officials here and the situation was reviewed at the cabinet meeting, after which further advice was sent forward to the American delegates.

Coincidence with these exchanges there were frequent expressions of the new administration quarters that the constitutionalist element should be brought into the mediation proceedings. It has become evident that this question of constitutionalist participation has brought about divided councils among the constitutionalists.

Whether this division will upset plans for sending a representative to the mediation or will give way before the stronger desire of the administration to have the constitutionalists represented is not clear. It was said today the state department had not been passed on finally by General Carranza.

Silliman Is Safe. One of the most threatening complications to mediation was removed today when definite word reached the state department that Vice Consul John R. Silliman, arrested at Saltillo and long sought for, had arrived at Mexico City, accompanied by the British vice consul at Saltillo, Mr. Macmillan.

While, however, Silliman himself is safe, there remain several grave features connected with his arrest. Unofficial reports have indicated that he was placed under arrest while acting as a United States consul, while imprisoned, tried as a spy and condemned to death. Also that the United States consulate was entered and the official archives taken. These indignities, if officially verified, remain to be atoned for in the ultimate settlement.

General Carranza notified constitutionalist headquarters here today that the constitutionalist armies had entered Saltillo, evacuated by the federal garrison.

Today's advices from Admiral Howard on his flagship, California, at Mazatlan, reported further advances.

GETS THIRD OF ESTATE OF FATHER HE KILLED

New York, May 22.—Chester B. Duryea, who recently killed his father, General Hiram Duryea, under the general's will made public today, received a third of the estate, the value of which is not stated, and in addition, the use for life of the Brooklyn home, and an income of \$5,000 a year, insured by the creation of a \$125,000 trust fund.

Duryea is in Bellevue hospital, where he was committed after he shot his father to death.

TO SAVE J.P. MORGAN FROM DEATH MELLEN SHOULDERED BLAME

Declares He Took Indictment Rightfully Belonging to Aged Financier Believing Criminal Action Would Kill Him.

TELLS DRAMATIC TALE WITH INTENSE FEELING

Assumed Responsibility for Grand Trunk Negotiations in Order to Shield Morgan, He Says.

Washington, May 22.—A dramatic climax marked the close of the sensational testimony of Charles S. Mellen, former president of the New Haven railroad, before the interstate commerce commission today, when, with evidence of deep emotion, Mr. Mellen declared the late J. Pierpont Morgan was cognizant of the Grand Trunk negotiations, on which he (Mellen) was criminally indicted for violation of the Sherman anti-trust act, and that he "took the indictment that belonged to him (Morgan)" believing it would have killed the aged financier, if he had been indicted.

Mr. Mellen spoke with intense feeling as he recited his efforts to shield the elder Morgan. This turned quickly to a show of resentment, however, as he told how the present J. Pierpont Morgan had suggested a "change in the presidency of the New Haven," at which suggestion Mr. Mellen declared with emphasis:

"I called his attention to the fact that I had been suffering under the humiliation of an undeserved indictment to protect his father."

The crowded courtroom listened with intense interest as this closing recital was given. Taking up the Grand Trunk transaction, on which Mr. Mellen's indictment was returned by the grand jury at New York, Governor Folk, chief counsel of the commission, asked:

"Morgan's Part in Deal. Did Mr. Morgan have anything to do with this negotiation for the exchange of the Ontario and Western with the Grand Trunk?"

"He did."

"What?"

"He took a very active part in the negotiation."

"What part, can you tell, if you know?" asked Mr. Folk.

"I did not know that Mr. Morgan knew there was a negotiation on until he came into my office when I had an appointment with Mr. Smithers and Mr. Chamberlain, and he took them what he thought they ought to do in order to have peace between the New Haven and the Grand Trunk interests. He told of previous negotiations, which, he said, extended over a period of twenty years (that is the term he used); I suppose it was a general term, and that he had bought a steamship line of them on the understanding he was to have the New London Northern for the New Haven road and that they never had carried out their agreement."

"This negotiation, he said, was with Mr. Smithers, professor, Sir Charles Rivers Wilson. He thought it was a great mistake; that they had not kept faith with him, and he was quite emphatic—as he was, you know, once in a very great while—in thinking they had not done as they should; had not kept faith with him. And he told them they should give up the New London Northern road; he did not care for anything further, and that that would be the only thing, in his judgment, that would ever result in permanent peace between the two properties. Then he retired from the room. I think Mr. E. C. Smith was present during part of that interview."

Confession Continued. Mr. Morgan retired and left Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Smithers and myself to continue the conference. I told Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Smithers that we would continue the conference on the basis that they should give no further attention to the question of surrendering the New London Northern road; they might do as they pleased with it; I did not care. The worst punishment I wished to see inflicted upon them was the completion of their line into Providence. If they felt there was enough in the situation to warrant making a traffic agreement with us for the interchange of business for the joint use of the lines along the Connecticut river between Windsor and White River Junction and between Windsor and Brattleboro—and we had not nearly completed our line between Brattleboro and South Vernon—I was glad to do it.

"I was asked to put my views in the form of a proposition or contract, which I did; it was submitted to them and within a week the grand jury proceedings commenced in New York and I was indicted."

"Did you write a letter to the district attorney taking the responsibility of shielding Mr. Morgan?"

"I did and I did it for the sole purpose of shielding Mr. Morgan."

"At whose instance did you write that letter?"

"I wrote that letter at the instance of Mr. Lewis Cass Lydard and Mr. Edward D. Robbins."

"Who dictated it?"

The two seven-passenger Oakland cars of value \$2,825 each, the two five-passenger Velle touring cars of value \$1,560 each, the nine five-passenger Overland touring cars of value \$1,150 each and the nine Ludden & Bates self-player pianos, value \$750 each, will be awarded for diligent attention to vote-getting and for nothing else.

Only Pardon or Interference by Court of Appeals Can Save Former Police Lieutenant From the Electric Chair.

JURY FOREMAN WEEPS AS HE GIVES VERDICT; FIFTH BALLOT DECISIVE

Becker's Counsel Announces He Will Appeal, and Is Granted Stay of Week to Prepare for Future Campaign.

New York, May 22.—Twelve men today decided for the second time that Charles Becker was the arch-conspirator responsible for the Rosenthal murder, which, nearly two years ago, awoke New York to a realization of corruption in the police department and opened a new era of police reform.

Becker, once a police lieutenant, was found guilty of murder in the first degree. Only a pardon or interference again by the court of appeals can save him from following to the electric chair the four gunmen who shot Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, early on the morning of July 16, 1912. The jury today decided that the gunmen were Becker's agents.

The fifth ballot decided Becker's fate. It was taken after the jurors returned from luncheon at an uptown hotel, where they went when Supreme Court Justice Seabury had finished his charge. It was unanimous for conviction. Tears streamed down the foreman's face as he announced the decision, and tears stood in the eyes of several other jurors. They had agreed that the corroboration which the district attorney failed to present at the first trial to support the stories of Rose, Vallon and Webber, the three accomplices who turned informers, had been furnished by new witnesses at the second.

GIVEN WEEK'S STAY TO PREPARE APPEAL. Becker's counsel announced that he would appeal, and gained a week's stay for the preparation of his future campaign. The defendant was granted a short meeting with his wife and his brothers, and then was taken back to his cell in the Tombs.

Becker and his wife were talking shortly before 5 o'clock in a room adjoining the sheriff's office when a court attendant announced that the jury had reached a verdict. Mrs. Becker was not permitted to accompany her husband to the courtroom. Newspaper men, court attendants, counsel for the defense and District Attorney Whitman and his staff were the only other persons allowed admission. The defendant's two brothers, Jackson and John Becker, the latter a detective lieutenant, hurried to a side entrance where they stood awaiting the verdict.

When the little group in the courtroom had found seats the twelve men who alone knew Becker's fate filed silently in with Foreman F. Meriden

# GIRL IS WOUNDED IN WAYCROSS DUEL

Domestic Difficulties Result in Shooting Between Storekeeper and His Son-in-Law.

Waycross Ga. May 22—(Special)—Following an exchange of shots this morning in which Miss Vergie Smith a 15-year-old girl was painfully wounded by four buckshot, A. O. Smith and Herbert W. Wilson his son-in-law, were placed under peace bonds.

Smith was arrested on a warrant sworn out by Wilson, charging assault with intent to murder, and released on a thousand dollar bond. Wilson was charged with assault and battery, carrying a pistol concealed and carrying a pistol without license. In warrants issued by Smith Bond was given in each instance.

Trouble between the two, Smith being Wilson's father-in-law, is of long standing and grew more acute in March when domestic difficulties resulted in Mrs. Wilson leaving her husband and returning to her father, who moved here some months ago from Valdosta.

The exchange of shots was on Plant avenue in front of Smith's place of business. It came after a short conversation. Reports as to what passed between the men and L. A. Wilson, father of Herbert vary, but eye witnesses state none of the parties seemed unduly excited at first. In a few minutes, however, it became apparent that there would be trouble.

It is claimed Smith told the Wilsons to stop passing his store. Smith says he merely told the elder Wilson he did not think he was treating him right. He said he had reference to Wilson's appearance before the grand jury recently in a matter placed before the jury by him, the outcome of domestic troubles between the younger Wilson and his wife. Smith used a shot gun and Wilson a pistol. Friends stopped the fight before more than one shot apiece was fired.

Cases made by city police will be tried next Thursday.

# YOUNG WHITE MAN HELD ON WOMAN'S COMPLAINT

Harrowing Story of Night of Torture Told Police by Woman.

As the result of a story of a night of torture told by a pretty young woman in a hysterical condition who staggered into the Western and Atlantic yard office near the stock yards, just before daybreak Friday, W. F. Archie a young white man, named by the girl as her assailant, was arrested about 1:30 o'clock Friday on a warrant sworn out by the young woman's husband.

The young woman was sent to the Grady hospital where she sobbed a piteous tale to Dr. Summerall superintendent of the hospital in which she accused Archie of luring her to a lonely spot in the woods near the railroad yards, and making advances to her there attacking her when she resisted him. She claimed that she was held captive by Archie for eight hours during the night and that it was 3 o'clock in the morning before she finally was able to free herself from her captor.

Archie denied to the county police officers A. T. Butler and Jesse Walters, who arrested him at the corner of Hilliard and Houston streets that he had been guilty of any crime.

The young woman stated that she and her husband were separated about one month ago and that late Thursday afternoon she set out from her apartment in Carnegie way to find a rooming place. She stated that on Luckie street she met a friend who introduced her to W. F. Archie and that he offered to help her find a rooming place. She also said that her husband was present and having known Archie in that way she stated that he told her to go with Archie and that he would find her a place to room.

She charged that Archie first insisted that she go with him to the Western and Atlantic yards where he said he wished to collect some money from a man in that neighborhood. It was near this place she said that he attacked her.

Archie was held in the county jail and a warrant was sworn out for his arrest. He is being held in the county jail.

**NICK WILBURN GRANTED RESPITE BY GOVERNOR**

**Two Weeks' Delay Granted in Order to Secure Hearing by Commission.**

Governor John M. Slaton has granted a two weeks' respite to Nick Wilburn, who is under sentence of death at Grays, Jones county, for the murder of John King, a farmer. In granting the respite, Governor Slaton issued the following statement:

In re Nick Wilburn, application for executive clemency.

Prison commission met in special session Thursday, May 21, 1914, for the purpose of hearing the application for clemency in the case of Nick Wilburn sentenced to be hanged on May 28, 1914.

The state's counsel were present, but the Hon. John R. Cooper was engaged in Laurens superior court and was unable to present the petition of his client.

Hon. Joseph E. Potts, solicitor general of the Ocmulgee circuit, who prosecuted the defendant, Nick Wilburn, and Mr. Homer Johnson, who assisted Solicitor Potts in the prosecution, informed the prison commission that there had been no delay intended in the case, and they further declared that of their own knowledge Mr. Cooper could not be present because of an engagement in the courts elsewhere and they further stated that in their opinion a respite of two weeks was reasonable and just and should be granted. Thereupon the prison commission recommended to me in writing a respite for two weeks in order that a reasonable opportunity be given to make such showing in the case as the facts warrant.

I, therefore, grant the respite for two weeks as an appropriate order will be drawn.

followed that of her husband, Sam Stoe, who is now doing five years in the Atlanta federal penitentiary for the same offense.


