

### TECH S MODEST REQUEST.

In presenting the state a new and splendid power plant, magnificently equipped with modern machinery of all kinds for the practical instruction of its students, representing value of \$200,000, the Georgia School of Technology is asking the state for an annual appropriation of \$10,000 for its operation and maintenance, a sum equivalent to just 5 per cent of the investment.

When the small and inadequate power plant which the institution has been using until now failed in service, and conditions reached a crisis for lack of necessary power to operate its machinery, appeals for relief were several times made to the legislature, but without result.

Under these circumstances Tech officials sided by public spirited citizens, made an appeal to the people of Atlanta and raised \$80,000 for the erection of a new building which is now nearing completion.

For this building presidents of leading machinery manufacturing concerns of the north and east have gladly supplied the equipment, giving something like \$125,000 worth of it solely on a basis of the adver tising value involved in its use by hundreds of students who will ultimately become the industrial leaders of the south. Not only have they given it gladly, but in the development of their purpose it becomes imperative to them to keep it up to date.

Here is a \$200,000 proposition which has cost the state not one penny, and yet be comes part and parcel of its property. With the need for it unquestioned, it would be worse than folly on the part of the state to refuse the modest sum asked for maintenance and operation. As a matter of fact. double the sum asked is really needed, but appreciating the financial difficulties confronting the state, the authorities of the institution have limited their request to \$10,000, which is the minimum limit in meeting absolute requirements

There is involved in the legislative action upon this appropriation the very effi ciency of the institution. Deprived of power its facilities for practical instruction would be useless, and that character of instruction is the vital element of technological train

Northern and eastern driends of Tech have made it these donations upon the heory that they would be put into service, they have promised others, but naturally would withhold them if state neglect should signify they were not wanted

The ultimate result aims far beyond the training of students It reaches out to state wide industrial development. In fact, it has already been planned to make the new power plant the basis of the engineering experiment station and research bureau which Tech proposes to establish with a view to assisting Georgia manufacturers in working out all of their engineering prob lems, in doing in fact, for the manufacturers of Georgia what the state agricultural college is now doing for its farmers

It is impossible to believe, under the circomstances stated, that there will be raised one single objection of any sort to this ap propriation In all reason, a simple state ment of the facts must win for it the unani mous approval of both the house and senate

# PATRONIZE HOME LABOR.

The Atlanta Clearing House for Unemployed, which has gained recognition from the United States department of labor for its good work, is asking the co-operation of the Atlanta public in a more loyal patronage of home labor

Patronage of home industry should be extended through the institution to the indi vidual, including the employment of Atlanta men and women as workers The Atlanta Clearing House for the Unemployed stands as the only medium to bring the employer and employee together without cost to either. The sole purpose of the clearing house is to aid in solving the problem of the unem-

ployed, who are a subject of national as well as state and municipal concern. The Atlanta agency draws no aid from the city, the state for any civic institution. The expenses of the office are paid by a public spirited citizen, and the board of directors is composed of five well-known Atlanta women.

At the recent meeting in Detroit, Mich of representatives of employment bureaus, state commissioners of labor, and officers from the United States bureau of labor, the most definite message sent out was that the establishment of the public registry for the unemployed was a negative aid unless it carried with it the supplementary effort to find employment for the people, and to in-terest employers generally in their obliga-

To sesume that Atlanta has not her part of the unemployed in this moment of worldwide distress would be irrational. She has her element of unemployed among both men and women, representing the professions. business, the trades and domestic labor. A little effort in aiding these people to secure employment, a little tolerance of their weaknesses and inelficiency, would prove an economy in the end, and do away with the alms giving and old-time charity method, which does not touch the real problem of the unemployed nor begin even its solving

The Atlanta oinstitution for the unem ployed is not asking money, but co-operation from citizens generally, in helping place the unemployed In creating labor for them, one hour's time goes farther than the giving of one dollar indiscriminately. Atlanta must not fail in doing her part for her unemployed through helping the agency estab lished specifically for their aid

### PROTECTION FOR LAND TITLES.

There is something well worth thinking about in the proposal pending before the Georgia legislature to place adequate and much beeded protection around Georgia land titles.

When a man puts a dollar in a bank, federal and state laws throw every possible safeguard around it Each bank must con duct itself in complete accord with laws laid down by state or nation, as the case may be, and if there is any deviation they are promptly called to account for it. They are regularly inspected in order to determine whether they are complying with these laws.

No such provision is made with reference to the ownership of real estate A man may own a piece of real estate worth \$1,000 or \$100,000, and it is equally subject to doubt arising from multiplied irregularities almost as numerous as the number of counties in which legal records of real es tate transactions are kept.

Why shouldn't the man with a valuable slece of property which is a fixed and immovable entity be just as much entitled to protection as a man with a dollar in the

Bills are, pending now in the legislature o remedy this evil, but strangely enough they have not aroused that degree of enthusiasm which the circumstances of the situation demand. One of these measures proposes a system of land title registration—s simplified form of the plan already adopted by other states; another seeks to perfect and unify the recording of titles and all the documentary evidence relating to them

The Constitution publishes today a comprehensive statement from J. T Holleman, who, having been long engaged in the busi ness of making real estate loans all over Georgia, is in a position to know just what owners have to contend, and something about the remedies that are needed. Mr Holleman gives his indorsement to the pendoffice of supervisor of county records in connection with the office of attorney general, with a view to bringing about uniformity in the keeping of these records and that com pliance with the law which will enable the investigator to ascertain at once the entire history of any piece of real estate with which he has to deal

Mr Holleman's statement is most interesting, showing in detail the difficulties with which real estate owners now have to contend. A perusal of it will convince any man of the necessity of some action which will-have the effect of relieving the doubt cast upon many transactions in laud because of the numerous variations in the method of keeping the records-almost as many as there age counties in the state

Far from viewing it as a trespass upon their province, the clerks of the superior courts and other county officers interested. will undoubtedly welcome legislation which would result in furnishing them a well-defined and systematic plan of keeping county records They are as deeply interested as any one in a satisfactory solution of this problem

The land registration bill and that pro posing supervision of county records are companion measures They will work well The two systems, properly carried together out, would bring about a revolution in the protection and safeguarding of titles in the state that would put value into every piece of property in it

As it is, we are transacting the higgest business that is carried on in the state in a careless and slipshod manner, which jeopardizes every foot of farm land in Georgia There isn't a man in the state that would carry on his own business under the same conditions as must often be accepted by those who buy or sell or lend money on land

There is no need of the legislature spending any great amount of time on this mat-The experiences of other states ore known: it is known, too, what forms of laws have brought the best results. These have been studied and presented in the pending measures The legislature cannot go wrong in enacting them.

If this legislature will provide a simple land title registration law and making provision for uniformity in the registration of the nations of the earth interested in base-

### Georgia's Lost Monument To Gen. Nathaniel Greene



Those Tar-heels up in North Carolina put one over on us Georgians in very nervy fashion. And we were there, officially represented, consenting to the throw-

out.

At Guilford, early in the month, there was unveiled a splendid equestrian status to Gen. Nathaniel Greene

who was so able a lieutenant to Washington, and who drove Cornwallis from North Carolina and Lord Rawdon from South Carolina and Georgia.

Cornwallis really beat him at Guilford Courthouse, but at such cost as to make the victory a disaster and cause his speedy retreat to safer environs at Wilmington Greene then determined to recover South Carolina from the British "or perish is the attempt" to quote his own words Eventually after the battle at Eutaw Springs, he succeeded and made the Americans masters of the southern situation

Congress presented Greene with a medal

Congress presented Greene with a medal of honor and a captured British standard. South Carolina voted him a large reward of lands and Georgia gave him a big plantation at Mulberry Grove, above Savannah, and the whole of Cumberland island

After the close of the war Greene returned to Rhode Island for a year, but his interests in Georgia drew upon his affections, and he sailed back to Savannah with his family and took up his residence at Mulberry Grove There he died on the 19th of June, 1788, and was buried in a vault in Savannah. It is said that the vault could not, after many years, be identified, and the whereabouts of his ashed is therefore unknown to this day. His death was proclaimed officially, and he was honored by many evidences of

and he was honored by many evidences of public mourning in various cities of the south and north

In one of the early congresses after the permanent organization of the government under the constitution—but which congress I cannot now recall—a resolution, or act, was passed making a liberal appropriation from the national treasury for the erection of a monument to General Greene, which memorial was to be located in Savannah

For some inexplained reason the work was not promptly prosecuted, and the supposition is that the appropriation lapsed by process of law

A few years ago the writer brought the matter to the attention of then Congressman William G. Brantley, who promises to look up the matter and endeavor to revive the appropriation, so that the Gresne memorial might be erected in Savannah Other more important matters I presume, prevented that action by Mr Brantley, but the North Caro-lina folk seem to have gotten onto the situation, with the consequence noted Geor-gia lost the memorial and North Carolina has it

# LAND TITLE CONDITIONS IN GEORGIA APPALLING; REMEDY IS ESSENTIAL

Editor Constitution I read with interest the communication of Mr David C. Barrow, of Felham, Ga., in your paper of the 12th instant, in which he commends the bill in troduced by Senator H A Boykin for the purpose of creating the office of supervisor of county officials and county records the attorney general of the state to be exofficio supervisor. For nearly forty years my sole business has been the negotiation of loans on farm lands in Georgia. Necessarily I must have had a great deal to do with the subject of land titles during this long period. In Joining with Mr Barrow in commending the Boykin bill-I trust that the prejudice of no member of the legislature will be aroused by the fact that I am in the farm loan business and, therefore, not entitled to be heard on this subject. Surely the tegislature is willing at all times to receive information from those whose business experience qualifies them to furnish definite and reliable information, If the legislature wants to know about land title conditions in Georgia the

can get the information from me and from men like me who have been engaged for many years in investigating titles in Geor gia, and who have spent fortunes in doing it.

I believe every country official in the state will welcome the passage of the Boykin bill appointing a supervisor of county officers and county records. In the one hundred and fifty-two counties of the state there are practically one hundred and fitty-two different methods of conducting the county offices, one hundred and fifty-two different forms of books, and one hundred and fifty-two different constructions upon the various laws of the state governing the county officials specifying their duties and relating to their records. There should be some source from which these county officials may receive legal advice upon all questions that come up in connection with their duties. There should be some official to their duties are being complied with and whether the laws are being complied with and whether the books are being properly kept.






