Bryan Opposed Any Action In Regard to the Lusitania That Even Looked to War

Resignation of Secretary Was Immediately Accepted and the Note to Germany Will Be Cabled as Framed by President Wilson-Utmost Good Feeling Marked Retirement of Bryan, and He Will Continue to Support President Wilson Politically—There Has Been Friction Ever Since the First Note Sent by United States in Regard to Lusitania.

Washington, June 8-William Jennings Bryan, three times democratic candidate for the presidency of the United States, and author of nearly thirty peace treatics with the principal nations of the world, resigned today as secretary of state as a dramatic sequel to his disagreement with President Wilson over the governments policy toward Germany

The resignation was accepted by the president' The calinet then approved the response which had been prepared to the German reply to the Lusitania note Acting Secretary Robert Lansing will sign the document, and tomorrow it will be cabled to Berlin,

Secretary Bryan will return to priate life tomorrow, when his resignaion takes effect. It was learned that he intends to continue his political support of the president. FEAR OF WAR

THE NEW BAGGAGE LAW.

It is to be expected there will be considerable complaint over the operations of the Cummins amendment to the interstate commerce law, which requires that persons making an interstate journey, by common carrier, shall personally value their baggage and pay the small fee required for any excess above \$100. For a time at least the traveling public will feel almost that it is being called upon to make out something like a customs house declaration every time it crosses a state line. The traveling man who has a large amount of baggage to take along with him will feel the inconvenience perhaps no less keenly than he did the disappointment over the brogation of interchangeable mileage. We are not prepared to speak as to the merits of the new law, nor is it likely that there is anyone who can do so in the absence of an actual test. But it looks as if it has (possibilities which entitle it to a fair and impartial trial. It was designed both for the protection of the railroad company and the traveling public-of the former against extortionate or false value placed upon lost property, and of the latter against the effort of the common carrier to limit its liability through notice printed upon its tickets, regardless of the actual value of the property itself. The average value of the contents of a traveler's trunk is considerably less than the \$100 limit which the railroads sought to fix. Travelers do not ordinarily put articles of great value in a receptacle proverbially considered at the mercy of the "bag gage smasher." There are exceptional cases, nor would it appear that 10 cents is too much to ask as insurance on an additional \$100 of value. As a method of definitely fixing the liability upon the railroad company, it appears both legal and effective. There is at least compensation in the law, notwithstanding the inconvenience it imposes.
