





WOMEN ON MUNICIPAL BOARDS.

The City Federation of Women's clubs again go on record as believing that the membership of women on municipal boards would be a value to the boards in a reso lution planned by the federation yesterday and to be presented to council. .

The resolution is not aggressive in purpose nor expression, but co-operative in spirit and logical in principle.

That women are painstaking and thorough in any investigation they make, and that by nature their love and interest extends to the child wherever he may be, in the home, in the school or in the crowded tenement house, were rightfully asserted in the varied reports made before the city federation, while there is no institution of the city's life toward which women are not giving their aid in some way. For better schools, hospitals, streets, public health, playgrounds, parks and public recreation, they are continually at work and their help is, of course, invaluable. The city and the chamber of commerce

have for years called upon organized women to aid in public movements for the city's good. They have always responded. Yet their work must always stop when their participation in the actual work of the city's governing boards would be both logical and The resolutions which will go to council

from the city federation will represent the request of a federated body of women numbering nearly 8,000. They are the women who respond to Atlanta's call whenever They represent the womanhood of made. the city, and they represent the home-makers and home-keepers and the mothers of the future citizens.

The request they make to council is something more than the mere expression of some momentary cause. It has nothing to do with politics-it is a demand of twentieth century civilization.

WAITING ON US.

You can't expect somebody else to erect a monument or set up a fountain in a pub lic park until the park is laid off and dedicated and some visible sign given of its permanent establishment.

Specifically, Atlanta and Fulton county cannot expect congress or any of the states that are interested to spend money in embellishing the civil war battlefields which surround this city, and which were among the most important of that war, unless we get busy and lay them out, dedicate them and make the substantial improvements that are essential to their preservation.

General Andrew J. West, who was Georgia's member of the national commission for the semi-centennial celebration of the battle of Gettysburg, calls attention in a communication, published in The Constitution today, to the interesting fact that 250,000 persons, prompted by various motives, visit Gettysburg every year.

Gettysburg has been made a national park. In it are set handsome monuments and numerous markers. Through it wind roads and walks and driveways. A place of historical interest has been made a thing of beauty and attraction. People are naturally drawn there, whether the motive be sentiment, pleasure or curiosity.

But let the stranger come to Atlanta seeking to make acquaintance with battlefields, even more sanguinary than that of Cettysburg, and what does he find? may be shown a distant tree-covered ridge and told that right over there was where the battle of Peachtree creek was fought. Desiring to go there, he will find access almost out of the question. It is the same with every one of the important battlefields around Atlanta, which, as General West has adinted out, were among the most impor-

tant and decisive of the civil war. Nothing has been done by others to mark these historic spots because we have done nothing ourselves. And yet others are not only willing and ready, but are waiting.

We have only to call to mind the recent letter of Governor Raiston, of Indiana, to County Commissioner W. T. Winn, of Fulton, and the latter's reply indicating an appreciation of the Indiana governor's sentiments and a willingness on the part of the Fulton county board to take hold of the work. 




