These are the conclusions of criminole gists who have just completed a most exhaustive quest for information concerning the source of criminal tendencies in penal institutions in eastern states. They refuse to believe that heredity has any important bearing upon the future of a child.

Environment, however, exercises such a marked influence over a boy or girl that it is suggested that the only solution of the crime problem is the improvement of conditions under which children are brought into the world and educated.

Conclusions of two physicians who had part in reaching these conclusions may be found in reports made by Dr. Edith R. Spaulding, resident physician for the reformatory for women at South Framington, Mass., and Dr. William Healy, director of the Juvenile Psychopathic Institute, Chleago. Their reports are based upon a careful study of 1,000 young criminals of

Drs. Spaulding and Healy analyzed the whole thousand cases in a paper read before the American Academy of Medicine in Minneapolis and now just published in pamphlet form.



Music Destroyer of Bridges



OES music weaken metallic or other Diridges? This question recently asked of a well-known bridge builder brought this

"Measured vibrations are more trying to any kind of bridges, and particularly to. suspension bridges, than irregular agitation. Music alone would not strain a bridge enough to injure it materially, but a regiment of troops keeping step to music when crossing a suspension bridge would subject it to a very severe strain. Consequently, it is customary to stop the music before troops reach the bridges, and let the

en break step, and march more or irregularly.

The reason for all this is obvious. The structure naturally will suffer least strain when at rest. When in uniform motion the bridge acquires a momentum equal to its entire suspended weight multiplied by the velocity of the motion. It is manifest that, in the case of a heavy structure, a uniform downward vibration, he it ever so small, would develop a momentum of many tons in the direction of a breaking strain. OWEVIR much we deery was and its horrors I believe one OWEVER much we deed a stronger better race of men, of its compensations will be a stronger better race of men, in space of the awful heartraches that come to men in leaving their families and having their natural ties broken there is certain inspiration in the thought that on the courage and dexterity of its armed men depends the future integrity of the various European

Woman's outlook and opportunities are to be enlarged. Thousands of responsibilities are already to be thrust on the shoulders of nomen responsibilities they have never known or only in a small degree. In Impland women are replacing men in factories and doing work they bave never attempted before. These positions are being offered to them at men's wages a higher scale than women have ever known.

In Germany great numbers of women are doing service as street ear conductors motor men guards at failway stations and even natirond conductors. The schools are being closed and every available inch of land is being tilled and cultivated by the women and the children. As the war goes on more and more will women be voked to toil and forced to try themselves in new occupations

Hundreds of others are learning lessons of self-reliance and steeling their nerves on hittleffelds is Red Cross nurses and in hospitals. Women and society both will pay the price of these added responsibilities they are forced to accept. I believe this is a terrible catastronic which will not be righted readily

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"The trade of the shipping ports had of course suffered immensely at the hands of both England and Napoleon. But the profits of the neutral carrier were enormous, nevertheless, in that troubled time. Ship building went forward very prosperously in America despite every order and decree of the belligerents; and so long as there was no embargo to restrain and make them outlaws at home, merchants almost cheerfully took the risks at sea. The embargo which immediately preceded the war was intended, of course, to call the shipping in for its own protection; but merchants hurried every available vessel to sea as soon as they heard it was to be passed, in order to be beforehand with it and take the risks congress sought to protect them against.

"Congress was obliged to resort at last to the very excise taxes which all republicans had so hotly condemned the federalists for imposing; to lay direct taxes on such articles of personal use as household famiture and watches; and finally, when the war was over but not the difficulties of finance, to re-establish the Bank of the United States (April, 1816). A few light duties on imports could not support the government when every principal harbor of the country was blockaded.

As in the Revolution so now, the heart of the country went untouched. * * * On the coasts English fleets swarmed thicker and thicker until almost every important port was effectually closed.





This status shows the most delicate work and understanding on the part of the sculptor. It is not intended to tell a story, it is intended simply to be a thing levely in itself.



The Merry Widow. This bust is of the most modern type of Italian art. It is a figure of the most difficult execution. The veil is all cut in marble of such delicate sculpture that the effect is that of a real veil. The drapery over the shoulders is of bronze. This figure is interesting for its execution rather than as a work of art.

COME exquisite sculptures, remarkable not only for their execution, but for the decorative effect produced by the use of colored marble and bronze in contrast with white Carrara marble, are displayed in the Italian Pavilion and the other exhibits of Italy at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco.

The ancient Greeks painted their statues in natural colors. What effect they produced we can only guess, as the color has long since disappeared from the Greck sculpture remaining to us, and as we do not know how skillful they were in employing it. But this modern Italian art may give us at least some idea of how statuary in colors may be made to

This work is not painted in the Greek fashion but obtains its color from the natural hues of the different marbles employed, and from bronze, both of which are used in conjunction with the white Carrara marble in which the sculpture is executed.

These are examples of the finest type of decorative art as contrasted with the monumental type of sculpture. They have remarkable freedom of pose and fairly seem to live. In fact, from the photographs, it seems difficult to believe that these are carved statues and not merely posed human beings.

This is all modern work by contemporaneous sculptors. Some of it does bear the impress of the Early Roman, but other pieces, for example, the Merry Widow, are thorenghly in the current note. These statues were a part of the wondrous freight of art brought over from Europe on the Jason.







Conception or and plans for the Pan American financial congress which meets in Washington this week are the thought and work of Secretary of the Treasury $Wilha \approx G$ McAdoo who has thus rendered an international service which will be more far reaching in important results perhaps thin the keen st toresight can now predict This conterence made up of ministers of

finance diplomatic representatives and foremost business men of all the Latin merican republics with the exception of Mexico and Hutti whose participation is presented by peculiar circumstances and including leading bankers and franciers of the United States especially invited to at tend will be in session in the Pan American Union building in Washington throughout the entire week. Its personnel will include in every instance the men most qualified to speak for the fuancial conditions plans and needs or their respective countries They are here as the guests of the United States and when the conference is concluded they will be taken by special train for a tour of the most important cities and sections of the country.

No time or this gathering could have been but r chosen than the present when many of the La n American countries are almost on the verge of financial crisis as a result of the European war Consequently when Secretary McAdoo suggested it Presi dent Wilson and congress were quick to appropriate its advantages and took the ners are steps to bring it together in accordance with Mr. McAdoo's ideas. President Wilson extended invitation to the Latin American governments to send their repres ntative it is upon Secretary Mc Adoo's invitation that resident diplomats and American financiers will attend

While the program of the conference covers many intricate financial details it may be stated generally that its chief purpose is to bring about a better understand ing both among themselves and on the part of financial interests of the United States of monetagy conditions and needs in these countries in the hope that some solution of their more pressing problems growing out of the European war' may be found. Some idea of how these problems have suddenly arisen may be surmised from the fact prior to the war the great volume of exchange and discount transactions of Latin Americal both on export and import trade, were con ducted through London and the capitals of continental Europe These financial channels have been closed to them and they must now seek a readjustment of their hole trade basis

It is not difficult to see how from a conference of this sort there may arise more intimate and friendly relations be tween the United States and these countries. It will mean better and more lasting financial relations and must give an impetus to our commerce with them opportunity for the rapid extension of which has so recently arisen.

In this work Secretary McAdoo who as is well known is a native Georgian, has demonstrated the same high qualities of statesmanship which he has so well shown in his former successes as a developer and builder of great projects

Women have their organizations nowtheir machines through which they can work but too much time is lost in details and obedient, but knowing little or nothing the swapping of theories at too frequent

Brief History

The Atlanta Medical college was founded in 1854 under the Ludership of Ib Tohn t Westmorehand. The legislature uppropriated \$15,000 for a building at the outbreak of the war the building was used as a hospital for soldiers. After the war the stringgles of the hospital reflected those of reconstruction days. The expenses of the college were paid from the pockets of the faculty and the notes of the students were taken for, their tuition. As a result of fri ition growing out of the administration of affairs there was a division in the faculty and in 1878 the Southern Medical college was founded. In 1888 the forces were again united and reorganized and the two colleges meiged under the name of the Atlanta College of Physicians and Surgeons. Subsequently donations of \$25,000 from Mr. Andrew Carnegie \$10,000 from the late Dr. A. W. Calhoun and \$5,000 from the Drught new departments and facilities to the Institution.




It will take about thirty days to install the engine, after which the boat will be put in active service between Macon and Brunswick.
