The day and a half intermission furnished a breathing spell for the State's prosecutor. He came back to the battle with new spirit and with an absence of the fatigue that compelled him to stop his stirring argument Saturday and ask Judge Roan for a recess. Knowing that it was the cloning day of the Frank trial and that a flery conclusion might be expected to the Solicitor's argument, hundreds were about the court room hoping that they might be among the fortunate to be granted admission to the small room. Frank was at the court house some time before Dorsey resumed his address. His mother and wife came in an antemobile shortly before court opened. The prisoner bore his usual unruffled and calm air.
