## FRANK SENTENCED TO DIE.

Execution Set for Oct. 10, but New Trial Is Asked For.

ATLANTA, Aug. 26.-Leo M. Frank. of Brooklyn, superintendent of the local factory of the National Pencil Co., who was convicted yesterday of murdering Mary Phagan, was to-day sentenced to death. The execution was set for October 10.

Before sentence Was pronounced Frank's attorneys moved for a new trial on the ground that several popu-lar demonstrations said to have been

heard by the jurymen had prejudiced the case. October 4 was set for the argument on this motion.

Frank kept cool while he listened to the reading of his sentence. Not until Judge Roan reached the concluding words did the factory suppointed. words did the factory superintendent display nervousness.

Newt Lee, the negro night watchman at the National Pencil Factory, was released from jail to-day. Lee was arrested immediately after he had reported the finding of the Phagan girl's body in the factory basement. Together with Frank he was bound over to the grand jury after a coroner's inquest but no indictment was ever returned against him him.

James Conley, negro sweeper at the factory, who told the Frank jury he helped dispose of Mary Phagan's body.
